Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends.

Today we hear the familiar parable of the talents. There are many ways to consider this parable. That's how it is with parables. They get us thinking, wondering, exploring, praying...

Here's part of a reflection I came across by Fr. John Foley, SJ. He was thinking about the third servant who hid his talent out of fear. Fr. Foley reflects:

In the realm of spirituality, there is one thing I know of that will go away if it is buried, but which gets greater if you use it. Love.

If fear closes the door tightly against love, guess where the loveless one will be. In the darkness outside the door, wailing and gnashing those teeth. Without love.

Get this: We are all frightened, and God always has compassion upon us. God waits for ages to see if we will not accept just a bit of the love he offers, and if we will even find just enough courage to invest some of it in other people. God is often disappointed in this risk he takes, and I'm sure he says, "oh no, not again" when we fail.

But this is the disappointment of someone who loves us very well. Let love in. Love casts out fear.

We are so, so close to reaching our CMA goal!!! If you are able to help us reach it, please do so this week. The rebate is really needed this year to help us catch up -- as is the raffle -- which thanks to you is also going very well. Many thanks for your much needed and appreciated support.

Thanks, too, for your attentiveness to last weekend's explanation of our Pandemic Procedures. As you heard, we are trying to come up with a plan for Christmas and appreciate your input and cooperation. I think we all have favorite seats, yet as you heard, as we try to "make more room in the inn" by moving into the middle of a pew as opposed to the end, by sitting in sections, e.g. sections for families, allows us to accommodate more people while at the same time following social distancing protocols. The procedures are explained again in today's bulletin. Many thanks for your help!

How comfortable are you with change? As we note changes around us – including the approach of winter and colder temperatures – consider:

Change is the very nature of life, welcome it.

A Note to Our Parishioners and Visitors...

Hello and welcome to Saint Philip and James Parish We understand the hesitation and uncertainty some feel about returning to indoor events including church. We hope to clarify some of your concerns by reviewing our church attendance with you. At the forefront of our procedures is always the reverence of our Holy place and the safety and well-being of our parish family while adhering to all guidelines given by the Department of Health (DOH), the Center for Disease Controls (CDC), the Diocese of Rockville Centre (DRVC) and local government agencies

Our church has been open every day since the start of this pandemic. Since mid-March our doors have been open for personal prayer from 7 am -7 pm daily and 7 am - 5 pm on Sunday. We have offered live-streaming Mass every day and have added live-streaming events and Mass times as needed. We are joy-filled to see our Parishioners once again seated in our pews and to hear your voices fill the hollow echo of empty space. It is our prayer to welcome you all back into our church walls to congregate as a loving and faith-filled parish community.

We ask you to bear in mind that while we are many parishes under the direction of DRVC, we are each individual and what works for one parish may not necessarily work for another. We respect the efforts each parish is making to welcome home their parishioners especially during the Christmas Season.

We are going to try and explain to you what works in our parish - policies, procedures and protocols that have been instructed by the DOH, CDC, and DRVC.

We ask that you MAKE a RESERVATION to attend Mass - contact tracing importance. Knowing attendance beforehand allows for strategic seating to accommodate all wishing to attend Mass

ALL MUST wear a MASK in church. You may remove the mask only to consume Holy Communion and replace while returning to your seat. Communion is not permitted to be distributed or received with gloved hands.

There is a SANITIZING STATION in the church lobby as well as in the church body. All are asked to sanitize upon entering and leaving church. Entrance to church is through THE CENTER DOORS ONLY.

An USHER GREETER will welcome you and guide you to your seat. This seat may not be where you May have sat for the past 5+ years and we ask you to understand these difficult times and our desire to fill the pews allowing as many fellow parishioners in our church as safely possible. Our church and stained glass windows are beautiful - take this time to enjoy a new view and appreciate the beauty of our church from a different view.

SEATING is limited and spaced allowing 6 ft recommendations. Every other pew is available for seating. X's marked on the open pew - denotes the 6 ft of distancing. These restrictions control the number allowable in our church body. While we can normally accommodate 700-800 that is now reduce to 400 due to pew elimination alone and reduced even further 130-150 allowing 6 ft distancing between neighbors. Families / couples may sit next to each other and need not distance the 6 feet between each other but must follow 6 ft distancing between pew neighbor.

little slower.

TRAFFIC PATTERNS are in place to reduce cross contamination between cohorts (groups). We are advised NOT to ask someone to "move over" after they have sat in a seat. We should not "climb over" or "pass in front of" others. One way traffic patterns are marked on the flooring as well as 6 ft space markers.

BOOKLETS, missals, and papers are not permitted in church. BULLETINS, limited in print, are available on the back pews but will not be handed out. Bulletins are available on line for your convenience. You may follow along with the reading using personal booklets or by following the link on our website to USCCB (United States Catholic Conference of Bishops). If using your cell phone be sure to shut off volume and sounds.

You will notice only ONE LECTOR during Mass for the readings. The CANTOR will remain at the lectern throughout Mass. To maintain safety precautions movement and people in the sanctuary is limited.

DISTRIBUTION of HOLY COMMUNION is followed most reverently and prayerfully. Our Presider will Don a mask and sanitize his hands. He will be assisted by one Extraordinary Minister who will distribute Communion to the back half of our church. PLEASE follow the DIRECTION of the USHERS. Cohorts will be directed to receive Communion separately. Cohorts will not criss -cross the center aisle. Careful measure has been taken to assure safe distancing between cohorts crossing each other when walking to and from Communion distribution. You are to remove you mask when you are receiving Communion - step to the side - consume Communion - replace your mask and continue back to your seat.

At the END of MASS traffic Patterns will flow from the SIDE AISLES to EXIT church. The side doors will be open and you are to exit from those doors.


Once again an usher will direct the movement of pews exiting. Please maintain distancing between neighbor when exiting, giving careful consideration to our elderly who may move a

You may remain in church after mass to pray or light a candle, however, we ask that you exit as soon as possible as we have staff that comes in AFTER EVERY MASS to CLEAN and SANITIZE the pews, door handles, restrooms and more before the next Mass begins.

COLLECTION BASKETS are in the CHURCH LOBBY during Mass. We appreciate everyone's continued generosity and certainly understand the hardships during these times. We are not permitted to pass a collection basket, however, contributions may be dropped into the baskets at church, mailed or delivered to the Parish Center

We are making every effort to keep all within our church healthy and safe. We welcome your return with us and look forward to the day we can remove restrictions and join together in full. Until then we hold you and your family and friends circle in our daily prayer at Mass. We miss you all.

We pray for you in Thanksgiving and hope you see you during the Christmas Season.

Reflecting with Sister T

Dear Friends,

Being in a curious mode, I checked one of my resources, the book Lights, Camera, Faith...! A Movie Lectionary to see which movie went with this coming week's readings. The movie was October Sky. I have never seen it, but the description was very intriguing. So, I will share some insights.

According to the book, "The film contrasts two world views, showing the limitations of underground mining and the limitless frontiers of space." It is about the relationship of a father and son. Like the servants in the Gospel reading, the young son Homer is gifted with many talents but must struggle with his father (who thinks he should be a miner) to use them well. During these past few months, I have come to know many gifted people who are struggling to use their talents. I have also observed some behaviors that are tough to deal with. Entitlement, the need to be right, selfishness, and disregard for the opinions of others. "Don't tell me what to do" seems to be the new mantra.

In the movie, young Homer, who is very talented in science, is at constant odds with his father. Homer has and does use his equivalent of the ten talents given by the master in the Gospel reading. Eventually, he teams up with another student who is also scientifically gifted. Because Homer has been faithful to his calling, he gets to "join in the master's happiness" when he is hired by NASA to train astronauts for shuttle missions.

In this situation, working together and being persistent has paid off. I am wondering if we took the time to listen to one another and perhaps just changed our perspective on some things, this world might be a more peaceful place. During this pandemic, we are sort of stuck in the "limitations of underground mining" as opposed to the "limitless frontiers of space." Change is hard, but without it there is no growth. I just read this quote by Trina Paulus: "To become a butterfly, you must want to fly so much that you are willing to give up being a caterpillar."

My prayer for you this week is for you to have that desire to fly. Let us also keep in prayer all those talented people who struggle to use their talents. May they be surrounded by friends who will cheer them on to serve the Father's Kingdom.

Spiritual Reflection by Ron Rolheiser, OMI

THE LAW OF GRAVITY AND THE HOLY SPIRIT

God is erotically charged and the world is achingly amorous, hence they caress each other in mutual attraction and filiation.

Jewish philosopher Martin Buber made that assertion, and while it seems to perfectly echo the opening line of St. Augustine's autobiography ("You have made us for yourself, Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you.") it hints at something more. St. Augustine was talking about an insatiable ache inside the human heart which keeps us restless and forever aware that everything we experience is not enough because the finite unceasingly aches for the infinite, and the infinite unceasingly lures the finite. But St. Augustine was speaking of the human heart, about the restlessness and pull towards God that's felt there.

Martin Buber is talking about that too, but he's also talking about a restlessness, an incurable pull towards God, that's inside all of nature, inside the universe itself. It isn't just people who are achingly amorous, it's the whole world, all of nature, the universe itself.

What's being said here? In essence, Buber is saying that what's felt inside the human heart is also present inside every element within nature itself, in atoms, molecules, stones, plants, insects, and animals. There's the same ache for God inside everything that exists, from a dead planet, to a black hole, to a redwood tree, to our pet dogs and cats, to the heart of a saint. And in that there's no distinction between the spiritual and the physical. The one God who made both is drawing them both in the same way.

Pierre Teilhard de Chardin, who was both a scientist and a mystic, believed this interplay between the energy flowing from an erotically charged God and that flowing back from an amorous world, is the energy that undergirds the very structure of the universe, physical and spiritual. For Teilhard, the law of gravity, atomic activity, photosynthesis, ecosystems, electromagnetic fields, animal instinct, sexuality, human friendship, creativity, and altruism, all draw on and manifest one and the same energy, an energy that is forever drawing all things towards each other. If that is true, and it is, then ultimately the law of gravity and the Holy Spirit are part of one and the same energy, one and the same law, one and the same interplay of eros and response.

At first glance it may seem rather unorthodox theologically to put people and physical nature on the same plane. Perhaps too, it some might find it offensive to speak of God as "erotically charged". So let me address those concerns.

In terms of God relating to physical nature, orthodox Christian theology and our scriptures affirm that God's coming to us in Christ in the incarnation is an event not just for people, but also for physical creation itself. When Jesus says he has come to save the world he is, in fact, talking about the world and not just the people in the world. Physical creation, no less than humanity, is God's child and God intends to redeem all of his children. Christian theology has never taught that the world will be destroyed at the end of time, but rather (as St. Paul says) physical creation will be transformed and enter into the glorious liberty of the children of God. How will the physical world go to heaven? We don't know; though we can't conceptualize how we will go there either. But we know this: the Christ who took on flesh in the incarnation is also the Cosmic Christ, that is, the Christ through whom all things were made and who binds all creation together. Hence theologians speak of "deep incarnation", namely, of the Christ-event as going deeper than simply saving human beings, as saving physical creation itself.

I can appreciate too that there will be some dis-ease in my speaking of God as "erotic", given that today we generally identify that word with sex. But that's not the meaning of the word. For the Greek philosophers, from whom we took this word, *eros* was identified with love, and with love in all its aspects. Eros did mean sexual attraction and emotional obsession, but it also meant friendship, playfulness, creativity, common sense, and altruism. Eros, properly understood, includes all of those elements, so even if we identify eros with sexuality, there still should be no discomfort in applying this to God. We are made in the image and likeness of God, and thus our sexuality reflects something inside the nature of God. A God who is generative enough to create billions of galaxies and is continually creating billions of people, clearly is sexual and fertile in ways beyond our conception. Moreover, the relentless ache inside of every element and person in the universe for unity with something beyond itself has one and the same thing in mind, consummation in love with God who is Love.

So, in reality, the law of gravity and the gifts of the Holy Spirit have one and the same aim.


Longing for a Leader

At the heart of the celebration of Christ the King (which always falls on the last Sunday of the year before Advent begins) is an understanding of Jesus as a king who was very different from the king whom the Jews expected would come to save them. They were awaiting a leader who would liberate their nation from their worldly oppressors. The modern-day equivalent for American Christians might be a longing for a leader to unify Republican, Democrats, and independents, a leader who can usher in understanding and peace between natives and immigrants, equality between men and women, reconciliation and unity between whites and people of color.

It is a mystery why Jesus didn't come to the Jews in the form they expected, nor does he come to us today making sweeping changes from the top down. Maybe there are times when we are disappointed and confused—like Jesus' contemporary Jews—because he didn't "fix" the world for them, and he won't "fix" it for us.
