Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends.

On the fourth Sunday of Advent, we're still longing. What are we longing for? For peace, for security, for hope, for experiencing Jesus deep in our hearts, for Christmas. In this year of pandemic, we also long for a return to "normalcy". Or do we?

Today's psalm response is *Forever I will sing the goodness of the Lord*. The psalmist who wrote those words and the faithful who pray (and continue to pray) those words did so and do so in all kinds of situations – good and bad. How important it is to pause and reflect on the goodness of God which is always present – even in the midst of a pandemic.

During Advent and Christmas we hear often from the prophet Isaiah. One of those passages includes the line, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light." (Is.9:1) Pope Francis reflects on this line saying, "This prophecy of Isaiah never ceases to touch us, especially at Christmas. This is not simply and emotional or sentimental matter. It moves us because it states the deep reality of what we are: a people who walk, and all around us – and within us as well – there is darkness and light."

So often during this past year we have experienced the darkness – illness, covid, death, unemployment, unrest, division, and more. But we have also seen great light – the generous outreach of so many to assist those in need, the creativity of people finding new ways to stay connected, the flexibility of people by adjusting to different ways of learning, of gathering, of celebrating, of praying. As is also proclaimed at Christmas from the gospel of John: "The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

As we long for the Light, we realize we are called to bring the Light to our world. We're called to return not to "normal", but to go deeper. We're called to shatter darkness with the lights of compassion, graciousness, patience, hope, love and joy. Let's celebrate the birth of the One who is Light and Love by being light and love in our world.

As we ready ourselves to celebrate our Savior's birth during these difficult days please know the love of our Parish Team for all of you. We are making every effort to keep everyone safe. Unfortunately, reservations are necessary to maintain that safety and not every request was able to be satisfied. We are deeply saddened by that, as we know you are as well. In our church calendar while Christmas is of course is December 25th, it is also a season. Please, if your health permits, come and celebrate with us on a Christmas weekday.

Thanks to Margaret Adams, our Director of Music, and members of our music ministry for their early Christmas gift -- this year's virtual Christmas Concert featuring among our talented seasoned singers, an addition -- my compadre, Father Joe! It was a delight and is accessible on our parish website. Give yourselves a treat! Thanks to all!

I pray that we all experience the joy and hope which Christmas brings, not only on the day itself, but throughout the coming year.

And, *In Unexpected Places*

but with my actions.



Christmas 2020

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

When he was elected as a Successor of St. Peter on March 13, 2013, our Holy Father chose the name *Francis*. It was a weighty decision with a prophetic message. Especially now, seven years later and with the publication of his latest encyclical *Fratelli Tutti* from the tomb of St. Francis of Assisi on October 3, 2020, the significance of the choice is clear: Pope Francis connects his papacy to St. Francis.

Through the ministry of our Holy Father, St. Francis of Assisi is close to the Church in these times. Therefore, as we draw near to Bethlehem at the end of this difficult year, I wish to recall two points Pope Francis highlights from the life of St. Francis. One will help us celebrate the Nativity of Our Lord; the other indicates a grace for which to pray during the holy season.

First, in his 2019 Apostolic Letter Admirabile Signum: On the Meaning and Importance of the Nativity Scene, Pope Francis emphasizes St. Francis of Assisi's foundational role in our celebration of Christmas. The Holy Father recalls the origins of the crèche and the first nativity scene inspired by the holy friar in 1223, by which the saint sought "to bring to life the memory of that babe born in Bethlehem." Importantly, the remembrance of Christ's birth that St. Francis desired to convey was brought alive in Greccio, a small village in Italy, not by statues but by people from the surrounding towns and countryside. Together with St. Francis, his friars, an ox and a donkey, they gathered at a cave to behold a manger full of hay over which the Eucharist was celebrated. That Christmas night, almost 800 years ago, Pope Francis reminds us, "the nativity scene was enacted and experienced by all who were present." That night, there was "no distance between the original event and those sharing in its mystery." (2) Encountering Christ, there was simply joy and hope.

This Christmas, in our world laden with the Crosses of COVID-19, political and economic turmoil, racism, financial hardship, and so many other societal ills and challenges – challenges that impact us on Long Island – let us remember this lesson from Greccio: Christmas is an event to be lived. It demands our participation. Like the women and men who embodied that first crèche, we must be present to Christ who is born for us. We must behold and receive Him.

Second, in Fratelli Tutti, Pope Francis shows St. Francis as an icon of Christocentriclistening. With great humility and charity, the saint reverently listened to others. He was
present to the various voices in his life – the voice of God, the voice of his neighbor, the
voice of the poor, the voice of the sick, the voice of nature – and by truly hearing them,
he was an instrument of peace, healing, and understanding. How different it can be for
us! The Holy Father says well what we know: "Today's world is largely a deaf
world...At times, the frantic pace of the modern world prevents us from listening
attentively to what another person is saying." Aware of this fact, the Pope encourages us,
in the midst of our hectic and polarized world, to be like St. Francis and "not lose our
ability to listen." (48)

This Christmas, when we approach the crib, let us ask for the grace to be attentive listeners. Let us ask for the grace to be like St. Francis, so that we may hear the voice of God and the voice of our neighbor and respond with the radical charity he exhibited.¹

Like Pope Francis, may we be moved by the example of St. Francis, and may St. Francis of Assisi's love for the Mystery of the Nativity, his ecstatic mysticism, his love for the poor, and his spirit of universal fraternity animate our celebration of Christmas this year.

May God bless you and your families this Christmas.

A Reflection from Sister T

December 16, 2020

Dear Friends,

We are getting ready to head into the Fourth week of Advent. As you continue your journey with Joseph let us turn to those last days before the birth. Like most of us, Joseph and Mary had expectations on how their lives would play out. We have come to reflect during these past weeks of Advent on how a message from God through an angel changed all of that.

A friend once said to me "no expectations, no disappointments". I don't think that Mary and Joseph lived by that rule for there were no disappointments just opportunities. Since they were in a deep relationship with God, they recognized that every change in their plans reminded them that they needed God all the more.

Have you ever found yourself vulnerable and perhaps in the middle of a change and reached out for help? That is a risky situation for you have no control of the response. Perhaps help will come, or it won't. The difference with Mary and Joseph is that in their most vulnerable and challenging of times they knew what they needed, they needed God. And the response would be consistent for God was always there for them.

All the unknowns that Mary and Joseph encountered did not sway their trust in God. They were spiritually grounded. Initially they may have been fearful but the message of 'do not be afraid' reassured them of God's love for them. During these times of so much uncertainty what are my/your needs? 
Religious Education News



Saturday December 26 Saint Stephen Acts 6:8-10;7:54-59 Ps 31:3cd-4,6,8ab,16bc,17 Matthew 10:17-22 Today's Gospel shows us how the mission of Christ affected the Virgin Mary even before Jesus became human through her.

However, that is not when his salvation plan began. Jesus is God; he has always existed. His

salvation plan impacted Mary in the moment of her own conception.

In the Nicene Creed we say that God "came down from heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man." In other words, his Spirit bathed Mary in his pure, holy presence. Even though she could not understand how the Messiah could possibly be conceived within her, by the grace of God's Spirit she could know that God was the one who was asking for it and God was the one who was doing it.

All of us are called by God to carry the presence of Christ and birth him more fully into the world. What are you doing about it? How much are you fulfilling your divine destiny? Remember, he always empowers us to accomplish whatever he asks us to do. God knows what he's doing when he calls us to continue what Mary began, and he is always trustworthy and dependable. There is nothing to fear, no reason to hold back from fulfilling our true destiny.

Everything that God does is always good, even when his plan for our mis-

sion requires a journey through the cross. If we follow Christ, sooner or later we hang with him on the cross, persecuted for our faith.

With this in mind, when he asks us to do something for his kingdom, of course our answer is yes, right?


Why wouldn't it be? Of course we want to cooperate with his plan. Mary shows us that we can yes

to his plan even when we don't understand it nor see how God could possibly do what he says he'll do.

It's normal to feel inadequate, like he cannot fulfill his plan through us, because we know we are weak, sinful, and unqualified. Don't trust your feelings about it; trust God!

Reflect & Discuss:

- When was the last time you said to God, "But how can this be? You want me to do WHAT? I don't understand why!" What were you afraid of?
- How strong was your trust in God?
- When God chooses you for a task or responsibility, what helps you move from uncertainty or confusion or reluctance into saying "ves"?
- 4. When the plans of God don't make sense or they seem unpleasant, how do you overcome your reluctance?

THE ILLUSION OF INVULNERABILITY

Whatever doesn't kill you makes you stronger. That's a pious axiom that doesn't always hold up. Sometimes the bad time comes and we don't learn anything. Hopefully this present bad time, Covid-19, will teach us something and make us stronger. My hope is that Covid-19 will teach us something that previous generations didn't need to be taught but already knew through their lived experience; namely, that we're not invulnerable, that we aren't exempt from the threat of sickness, debilitation, and death. In short, all that our contemporary world can offer us in terms of technology, medicine, nutrition, and insurance of every kind, doesn't exempt us from fragility and vulnerability. Covid-19 has taught us that. Just like everyone else who has ever walked this earth, we're vulnerable.

I'm old enough to have known a previous generation when most people lived with a lot of fear, not all of it healthy, but all of it real. Life was fragile. Giving birth to a child could mean your death. A flu or virus could kill you and you had little defense against it. You could die young from heart disease, cancer, diabetes, bad sanitation, and dozens of other things. And nature itself could pose a threat. Storms, hurricanes, tornadoes, drought, pestilence, lightening, these were all to be feared because we were mostly helpless against them. People lived with a sense that life and health were fragile, not to be taken for granted.

But then along came vaccinations, penicillin, better hospitals, better medicines, safer childbirth, better nutrition, better housing, better sanitation, better roads, better cars, and better insurance against everything from loss of work, to drought, to storms, to pestilence, to disasters of any kind. And along with that came an ever-increasing sense that we're safe, protected, secure, different than previous generations, able to take care of ourselves, no longer as vulnerable as were the generations before us.

And to a large extent that's true, at least in terms of our physical health and safety. In many ways, we're far less vulnerable than previous generations. But, as Covid-19 has made evident, this is not a fully safe harbor. Despite much denial and protest, we've had to accept that we now live as did everyone before us, that is, as unable to guarantee own health and safety. For all the dreadful things Covid-19 has done to us, it has helped dispel an illusion, the illusion of our own invulnerability. We're fragile, vulnerable, mortal.

At first glance, this seems like a bad thing; it's not. Disillusionment is the dispelling of an illusion and we have for too long (and too glibly) been living an illusion, that is, living under a pall of false enchantment which has us believing that the threats of old no longer have power to touch us. And how wrong we are! As of the time of this writing there are 70.1 million Covid-19 cases reported worldwide and there have been more than 1.6 million reported deaths from this virus. Moreover the highest rates of infection and death have been in those countries we would think most invulnerable, countries that have the best hospitals and highest standards of medicine to protect us. That should be a wake-up call. For all the good things our modern and post-modern world can give us, in the end it can't protect us from everything, even as it gives us the sense that it can.

Covid-19 has been a game-changer; it has dispelled an illusion, that of our own invulnerability. What's to be learned? In short, that our generation must take its place with all other generations, recognizing that we cannot take life, health, family, work, community, travel, recreation, freedom to gather, and freedom to go to church, for granted. Covid-19 has taught us that we're not the Lord of life and that fragility is still the lot of everyone, even in a modern and post-modern world.

Classical Christian theology and philosophy have always taught that as humans we are not self-sufficient. Only God is. Only God is "Self-sufficient Being" (*Ipsum Esse Subsistens*, in classical philosophy). The rest of us are contingent, dependent, interdependent ... and mortal enough to fear the next appointment with our doctor. Former generations, because they lacked our medical knowledge, our doctors, our hospitals, our standards of hygiene, our medicines, our vaccines, and our antibiotics, existentially felt their contingency. They knew they weren't self-sufficient and that life and health could not be taken for granted. I don't envy them some of the false fear that came with that, but I do envy them not living under a pall of false security. Our contemporary world, for all the good things it gives us, has lulled us asleep in terms of our fragility, vulnerability, and mortality. Covid-19 is a wake-up call, not just to the fact that we're vulnerable, but especially to the fact that we may not take for granted the precious gifts of health, family, work, community, travel, recreation, freedom to gather, and (yes) even of going to church.
