Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

Today's gospel parable reminds us that sometimes God's ways and our ways are not "in sync"! We can get so caught up in what's "fair" by our standards, we lose sight of the overwhelming generosity of God's love for all – including us. With God, people are judged on an entirely different scale of values than the ones we use. God, like the landowner, is generous to both the big producers and the seemingly-undeserving. It is not in our hands to decide and give rewards based on what others have or have not done for God. When it comes to a final reckoning God will have the last word -- and it will be a generous one!

Today is Catechetical Sunday. The 2020 theme is "I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you". Catechetical Sunday is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the role that each person plays, by virtue of Baptism, in handing on the faith and being a witness to the Gospel. Catechetical Sunday is an opportunity for all to rededicate themselves to this mission as a community of faith.

SSPJ School is in its second week. It's great seeing the students and faculty back. I'd like to thank all who have worked and continue to work so hard to ensure the safety of all, thereby creating a wonderful environment where Christ is known, celebrated and welcomed.

We are also excited about our Religious Education Program for the upcoming year. Over the summer the Rel. Ed. Staff have worked very creatively and generously in designing an online program which will touch the hearts not only of the students but the entire family. We have put together a welcome video explaining the program which may be viewed on the parish website. It is important that registration be completed by October 13th, 2020 so that user names, books, etc. can all be readied. Next week we will begin Eucharist Adoration. This season Adoration will be moved from Thursday and Friday to Mondays from 1:30 to 7 pm. 

A Reflection from Sister T~

Dear Friends,

On Monday, September 14, the Church celebrated the feast of the Exultation of the Holy Cross. I am blessed to be in a parish where the homilies are always challenging. Thank you, Fr. Tom and Fr. Joe! I thought I would share with you something from Fr. Tom's homily on Monday.

As Catholics, when we begin to pray, it is natural for us to begin with the sign of the cross. When Fr. Tom was young, his grandmother taught his siblings and him how to make the sign of the cross. With fingers to forehead, she would say in her heavy Irish brogue, "God is not just an idea; He is not far away. He came down from heaven and you could see him in Jesus." She would, then, move her hand to her heart and say, "We are called to take God out of our minds and bring Jesus into our hearts. And how do you know it is real?" At this point, she would move her hand from shoulder to shoulder, opening her arm in a wide, welcoming arc. "It's the work of the Holy Spirit -- you let people in, in a new way."

Fr. Tom goes on to say, "That is why we begin with the sign of the cross: to bring God into the real world so that you and I can receive each other in a different way." If there is any time that we need to stop and think about how we receive each other and how we bring God into the world, it is during these challenging times of the pandemic. For many, patience is wearing thin. It reminds me of the <u>first reading on Monday</u> which speaks of the Israelites complaining to God and Moses: "With their patience worn out by the journey, the people complained against God and Moses..." (Numbers 21:4-5). Sound familiar?

We do have choices. We can be like the serpents with "biting and hurtful" words and actions to one another. Or, we can celebrate the Triumph of the Cross and be the truth that the cross teaches: "Love is stronger than death!" Believe me, this takes practice, but we can't give up. Jesus teaches us a new way to live. We need to keep our eyes fixed on the Triumph of the Cross and greet each day with an open heart.


The challenge is to live the Triumph of the Cross which means to bring God out of our minds into the real world so that you and I can receive each other in a different way. During this week, take time to look at a cross you may have in your home or wear as a piece of jewelry. Pray this simple prayer: "Jesus, I trust in you; I trust in this way; raise up my life."

May your week be a time of celebrating the Triumph of the Cross.

MOVING BEYOND MISTAKES AND WEAKNESSES

The excusable doesn't need to be excused and the inexcusable cannot be excused.

Michael Buckley wrote those words and they contain an important challenge. We're forever trying to make excuses for things we need not make excuses for and are forever trying to excuse the inexcusable. Neither is necessary. Or helpful.

We can learn a lesson from how Jesus dealt with those who betrayed him. A prime example is the apostle Peter, specially chosen and named the very rock of the apostolic community. Peter was an honest man with a childlike sincerity, a deep faith, and he, more than most others, grasped the deeper meaning of who Jesus was and what his teaching meant. Indeed, it was he who in response to Jesus' question (Who do you say I am?) replied, "You are the Christ, the son of the Living God." Yet minutes after that confession Jesus had to correct Peter's false conception of what that meant and then rebuke him for trying to deflect him from his very mission. More seriously, it was Peter who, within hours of an arrogant boast that though all others would betray Jesus, he alone would remain faithful, betrayed Jesus three times, and this in Jesus' most needy hour.

Later we are privy to the conversation Jesus has with Peter vis-à-vis those betrayals. What's significant is that he doesn't ask Peter to explain himself, doesn't excuse Peter, and doesn't say things like: "You weren't really yourself! I can understand how anyone might be very frightened in that situation! I can empathize, I know what fear can do to you!" None of that. The excusable doesn't need to be excused and the inexcusable cannot be excused. In Peter's betrayal, as in our own betrayals, there's invariably some of both, the excusable and the inexcusable.

So what does Jesus do with Peter? He doesn't ask for an explanation, doesn't ask for an apology, doesn't tell Peter that it is okay, doesn't offer excuses for Peter, and doesn't even tell Peter that he loves him. Instead he asks Peter: "Do you love me?" Peter answers yes – and everything moves forward from there.

Everything moves forward from there. Everything can move forward following a confession of love, not least an honest confession of love in the wake of a betrayal. Apologies are necessary (because that's taking ownership of the fault and the weakness so as to lift it completely off the soul of the one who was betrayed) but excuses are not helpful. If the action was not a betrayal, no excuse is necessary; if it was, no excuse absolves it. An excuse or an attempt at one serves two purposes, neither of them good. First, it serves to rationalize and justify, none of which is helpful to the betrayed or the betrayer. Second, it weakens the apology and makes it less than clean and full, thus not lifting the betrayal completely off the soul of the one who has been betrayed; and, because of that, is not as helpful an expression of love as is a clear, honest acknowledgement of our betrayal and an apology which attempts no excuse for its weakness and betrayal.

What love asks of us when we are weak is an honest, non-rationalized, admission of our weakness along with a statement from the heart: "I love you!" Things can move forward from there. The past and our betrayal are not expunged, nor excused; but, in love, we can live beyond them. To expunge, excuse, or rationalize is to not live in the truth; it is unfair to the one betrayed since he or she bears the consequences and scars.

Only love can move us beyond weakness and betrayal and this is an important principle not just for those instances in life when we betray and hurt a loved one, but for our understanding of life in general. We're human, not divine, and as such are beset, congenitally, body and mind, with weaknesses and inadequacies of every sort. None of us, as St. Paul graphically says in his Epistle to the Romans, ever quite measure up. The good we want to do, we end up not doing, and the evil we want to avoid, we habitually end up doing. Some of this, of course, is understandable, excusable, just as some of it is inexcusable, save for the fact that we're humans and partially a mystery to ourselves. Either way, at the end of the day, no justification or excuses are asked for (or helpful). We don't move forward in relationship by telling either God or someone we have hurt: "You have to understand! In that situation, what else was I to do too? I didn't mean to hurt you, I was just too weak to resist!" That's neither helpful, nor called for. Things move forward when we, without excuses, admit weakness, and apologize for betrayal. Like Peter when asked three times by Jesus: "Do you love me?" from our hearts we need to say: "You know everything, you know that I love you."

Never Too Late to Change

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Ezekiel 18:25-28 Personal responsibility
- ► Philippians 2:1-11 Imitating the humility of Christ
- ► Matthew 21:28-32 Parable of the two sons

All three readings today give advice and encouragement for every person to live an upstanding life. The first reading from Ezekiel does this by way of a threat that was in keeping with how the ancient Jews thought of life and death. The idea of everlasting heaven and hell hadn't developed yet, so they didn't believe in the afterlife as we do. They thought that if you don't live a just and virtuous life, your punishment would be an early death. On the flip side, if you lived well, you would earn yourself a longer life. It's not hard to imagine how that thinking developed into the Christian understanding that how we live on earth will determine our fate for the afterlife. Jesus, and later St. Paul, expanded on this idea by stressing that God's mercy and grace reach beyond human behavior. We don't earn our salvation—God grants it.

Jesus' parable today seems straight-forward. It's better for a child ultimately to do what he or she was asked, even if they didn't agree to it initially. The chief priests and elders gw.mmma.w... knew right away that is the preferred outcome compared to a son who promises

He is talking to the chief priests and elders, the ones who thought they were the good ones, the righteous ones, the virtuous, chosen ones who deserved to be handed the Kingdom of Heaven because of their good behavior.

something but doesn't follow through. So what is the point of

the parable? It seems so obvious.

Yet he points out that when John the Baptist came preaching repentance, inclu-



sion, and economic and social justice, they dismissed him and ignored his message. On the other hand, the tax collectors and prostitutes (people looked down upon and ridiculed by the chief priest and elders) listened and heeded John the Baptist. They had the humility to recognize they needed to ask forgiveness and change their ways, and they did. Suddenly, Jesus' point becomes clear-it's never too late to change our ways, ask for forgiveness, and be welcomed into the Kingdom. On the other hand, if we say

we want to do God's will, but never get around to it, we are no better than the hypocritical chief priests and elders.
