

Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

Rejoice! Today, the third Sunday of Advent, is Gaudete or Rejoicing Sunday! The third candle lit on the Advent Wreath is pink, to symbolize the joy we are called to. The readings today bring this joy home. Here's part of a reflection by Fr. John Foley, SJ:

Zephaniah says that the Lord "will sing joyfully because of you, as one sings at festivals." Because of you! Have you ever in your life thought that God's might be singing because of you? Have you ever let your image of God expand that far? We are God's song...Let your life be what it is: God's joyous, interweaving, always consonant melody, sounding outwards in deepest joy.

Sister Joyce Rupp in a meditation for today entitled "A Joyful Heart, A Cheerful Attitude" suggests that "Advent invites us to open the eyes and ears of our heart to a joyful receptivity of Christ's presence. Joy can move us toward overt self-orientation, but it most often promotes gratitude, praise, eagerness to share and enthusiasm of the Creator's gifts. Perhaps the best present we could give one another this Christmas is a joyful heart and a cheerful attitude."

I'm looking forward to this evening's Christmas concert! Our Music Director, Margaret Adams and the combined choirs have once again put their whole hearts into presenting us with what always is a most delightful evening. Give yourself a treat. Sunday evening, 6:30pm in the church. Free admission. I hope to see you there!

Today at the 10am Mass, we meet those enrolled in our RCIA program this year as we celebrate with them the Rite of Acceptance. These Apostles of Hope are preparing to receive the Easter sacraments and they call us as a community to deeper conversion as they look to us to meet the living Christ. After Christmas they will begin being dismissed from each of the Masses to reflect more deeply on the Word and to immerse themselves in the study of our faith. At that time we will all be invited to take one of their names and be invited to pray for them as their journey continues.

On Monday evening at 7 pm in the church we will hold a communal celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation to assist in our Christmas preparation.

To help us welcome and prayerfully celebrate Eucharist on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist are kindly asked to check the schedule in the prayer room and to fill in any available spots. Let's again each of us go out of our way to welcome those joining us to celebrate the Lord's birth with full voice and opened hearts.

And, in the spirit of the season:

The Sacrament of Reconciliation

Celebrating the sacrament of Reconciliation during the season of Advent is a powerful way to prepare for the celebration of Christmas. This sacrament celebrates God's love for us, and God's desire that we relish that love and allow it to overflow into our lives.

The sacrament of Reconciliation has a long and varied history. As with all our sacraments, it has a personal and communal dimension. The revision s in the ritual following the Second Vatican Council reminds us of importance of both dimensions. We're called to:

Gather-Reflect on God's word-Reflect on our response-Confess our sins, our sorrow, and our desire to respond more generously to God's love-Receive God's mercy and go forth to live that love.

On Monday evening, December 17th, 2018 there will be a Communal Reconciliation Service in Sts. Philip & James Church at 7:00pm.

We will gather in song as the candles of the Advent Wreath are lit, reminding us that Christ our Light overcomes any and all darkness.

We will listen and respond to the Word of God proclaimed.

The homily will invite us to reflect on God's love for us and God's invitation to deepen our experience of God's love, mercy, and forgiveness.

As a community, we will be led in a simple examination of conscience, and allowing God to gently reveal to us and sinfulness we need to admit.

As a community, will be given an act of penance to help us heal our relationships with God, others and ourselves and will pray an Act of Contrition together.

As music plays we are invited to approach on the priests stationed around the church, confessing the sin revealed and receiving individual absolution.

We continue on our almost concluded Advent journey, praying that all of us feel and nurture Emmanuel, God-with-us, this Christmas and throughout our lives.



RCIA ~ Rite of Welcoming

<u>Sister T:</u> Well Leo is still away and so I thought I would share with you a part of the prayers that will be offered to the Catechumens and Candidates this weekend. At one part of the ceremony Fr. Tom will call the group up with their sponsors and then asks the Sponsors to place a sign of the cross on their person as he prays the following:

Receive the cross on your forehead it is Christ himself who now strengthens you with this sign of his love. Learn to know and follow him.

- ...on your ears, that you may hear the voice of the Lord.
- ...on your eyes, that you may see the glory of God.
- ...on your lips, that you may respond to the word of God.
- ...over your heart, that Christ may dwell there by faith.
- ...on your shoulders, that you may bear the gentle yoke of Christ.
- ...on your hands, that Christ may be known in the work that you do.
- ...on your feet, that you may walk in the way of Christ.

It is a powerful expression of how each part of our body glorifies God.

Reflections on Next Sunday's Scripture Readings

Micah 5:1-4a Psalm 80 Hebrews 10:5-10 Luke 1:39-45

We live in an age of technological marvels. Events in the most remote corners of the world are flashed to our television sets in an instant. Diseases thought to be untreatable are now cured by miracle drugs. Computers process vast stores of knowledge in seconds. Today's readings would not have us ignore these valuable innovations; they would only have us pause in order to remember that our God is the infinite source of all help.

In the first reading Micah announces a future Davidic king who will conquer his people's enemies. Seemingly lowly Bethlehem will be God's birthplace of salvation. To everyone's surprise this ideal king will put more stock in Yahweh than in military power: "He shall stand and feed his flock in the strength of the Lord" (verse 4). For Micah, the point is to trust in God for deliverance.

In Psalm 80, Israel appeals to Yahweh to intervene against the enemy. The psalmist outlines the role of the divine shepherd. Human resources are inadequate, the earthly shepherd needs the protection of the divine.

Mary is the model Christian since she is the very embodiment of trust in God. In the Annunciation scene (Luke 1:26-38), Luke contrasted her faith response with Zechariah's incredulity. In this visitation scene Elizabeth says, "And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord." Luke conveys Mary's enormous capacity to trust.

What is God's plan for our lives? Human resources may reveal part of the answer. True faith, however, will trust in divine resources for the final resolution. Mary blessed are you among women

For reflection...


Mary set out to visit Elizabeth, a difficult journey. Why do you think Mary sought out Elizabeth? Who are the people in your life whom you seek out in challenging situations?

Elizabeth recognized the presence of God in Mary, and responded. When have you recognized God's presence in the people in your life? How did you respond?

Besides being the birthplace of David what were some other reasons that God chose
Bethlehem, which was too small to be among the clans of Judah, and a stable and manger for Jesus' birth?

If you were expecting a majestic ruler how
would you have felt about the stable and
manger? When you experience poverty in
your life, do you accept it as a meeting
place with God or do you run from it?

OUTSIDE THE CITY

God, it seems, favors the powerless, the unnoticed, children, babies, outsiders, and refugees with no resources or place to go.

That's why Jesus was born outside the city, in a stable, unnoticed, outside all fanfare, away from all major media, and away from all the persons and events that were deemed important at the time, humble and anonymous. God works like that. Why?

In the rock opera, Jesus Christ Superstar, that question is asked of Jesus: Why'd you choose such a backward time in such a strange land? If you'd come today you could have reached a whole nation. Israel in 4 BC had no mass communication.

Scripture answers by telling us that God's ways are not our ways and *our ways are not God's ways*. That's true here. We tend to understand power by how it works in our world. There it works through popularity, through mass media, through historical privilege, through financial clout, through higher education, through idiosyncratic genius, and, not infrequently, through raw aggression, greed, and insensitivity to the needs of others and of nature.

But even a quick reading of scripture tells us that's not how God works. The God that Jesus incarnates doesn't enter into this world with a huge splash, as a royal birth eagerly anticipated and then announced by all the major media outlets, with photos of him and his parents on the cover of every popular magazine, with universal predictions as to his future greatness and influence, and then with privileged access to the best educational institutions and circles of power and influence.

Clearly, clearly, that's not the story of Jesus' birth, nor of how his life unfolded. God, as scripture shows, works more through anonymity than through the headlines, more through the poor than the powerful, and more through those outside the circles of power than those inside them. When we examine how God works, we see it's no accident that Jesus was born outside the city and that after he was crucified he was also buried outside the city.

God's work in our world generally does not make the headlines. God never breaks into our world or into our consciousness by showy displays of power. God works more discretely, in quiet, touching soul, touching conscience, and touching that previously touched part inside of us where we still unconsciously bear the memory of once, long before birth, being touched, caressed, and loved by God. That's why Christ was born into this world as a baby and not as superstar, as someone whose only power was the capacity to touch and soften the hearts of those around him. Babies overpower no one, physically, intellectually, or athletically. They lie helpless and cry for love and care. That's why, paradoxically, at the end of the day, they're more powerful than anyone else. No physical, intellectual, or athletic power can ultimately touch the human conscience as can a baby – and similar sights of innocent helplessness, a wounded bird, an abandoned kitten, a young child alone and crying. What's best in us enflames, healthily, in the presence of powerlessness and innocence.

That's how God enters into us, gently, unnoticed. No big splash. That's also why God tends to bypass circles of power to favor the abandoned and vulnerable. For example, when the Gospel of Luke records how John the Baptist came to be specially blessed, it takes a scathing swipe at both the civic and religious powers of its time. It names all the major civil and religious leaders of the time (the Roman rulers, the kings in Palestine, and the religious high priests) and then tells us plainly that the word of God bypassed them all and came instead to John, a solitary, living in the wilderness. (Luke 3, 1-3) According to the Gospels, the wilderness is where we're most likely to find and experience God's presence because God tends to bypasses the centers of power and influence to find a place instead in the hearts of those outside those circles.

You see this too, though admittedly without the same theological weight as is manifest in scripture, in the various apparitions of Mary, Jesus' mother, that have been approved by the church. What's common to all of them? Mary has never appeared to a president, a pope, a major religious leader, a Wall Street banker, the CEO of a major company, or even to an academic theologian in his study. None of these. She's appeared to children, to a young woman of no earthly importance, to an illiterate peasant, and to various other persons of no worldly status.

We tend to understand power as residing in financial influence, political clout, charismatic talent, media influence, physical strength, athletic prowess, grace, health, wit, and attractiveness. On the surface, that assessment is accurate enough, and indeed none of these are bad in themselves. But, looked at more deeply, as we see in the birth of Christ, God's word bypasses the centers of power and gestates instead in the hearts and consciences of those *outside the city*.
