Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

In today's gospel we're told to pray without becoming weary, persevering even when "results" don't seem to appear. This has never been easy, but seems particularly challenging in the times in which we live, so filled with fast food options, speedy internet connections, and often instant gratification. But some things never change, always deepening in essence over time. Like fine wine, good relationships need time to grow and deepen.

This is also true of our relationship with God. A key way of nurturing that relationship is prayer – all kinds of prayer – asking, thanking, praising, and most especially listening. Not recognizing "results" in your prayer? Keep at it. Nurture it. Like Moses in the first reading, don't give up. Seek support. Allow others to assist you. As Paul tells Timothy in the second reading, the sacred Scriptures are capable of giving you wisdom. Pray with them! God is present, and is with us for the long haul. And back to the gospel – like the persistent widow – never give up!

This Saturday at the 5:00 mass, we present our 8th grade students with the Creed. This prayer of states our faith beliefs. Sometimes when we pray a prayer so often, as we do with the Creed, it's very helpful to take some time to reflect on just what we are saying. One way of doing this is to take the statements proclaimed and turn them into questions. *Do you believe in God, the Father?* *Do you believe in Jesus Christ, our Lord?*.... *Do you believe in the Holy Spirit, the Church, the Communion of Saints,*.... Reflecting on these questions as they prepare for Confirmation will hopefully enable our 8th graders (and us) to respond with deeper faith and understanding, Yes, I do believe!

We are also delighted to welcome our first graders at the Sunday 10am mass. They have recently completed their church tours, learning much about many of the items in the church. This will help them as they prepare to receive First Communion next year.

A reminder to all those who serve us in liturgical ministries to set aside the morning of Saturday, November 9th, at 11am, for a morning of reflection with Fr. Kevin Cronin, OFM, in anticipation of a recommissioning service at all the Masses that weekend.

Our October 26th Italian feast is fast approaching! It promises to be an evening filled with surprises, great food, dancing and more. Tickets are going quickly. Why not get one and join in the fun!



Soon after the birth of my son Charlie,* who has Down syndrome, a visitor asked whether he was "mild, moderate, or severe"—referring to his level of cognitive impairment. I was shocked. In my arms I held my beautiful baby boy, who defied easy categorization.

It's like looking at stained glass from the outside: the colors look dark, and you can't see the figures. But inside, with the sun shining through, the effect can be brilliant.

Clinical labels don't tell the whole story.

From inside our family, love illuminates our life with Charlie. What may seem dreary to others, perhaps even unbearable, is actually filled with beauty and color. Our love has nothing to do with his abilities. We love him simply because of who he is, and understanding this teaches us a fundamental truth: every life is a good and perfect gift.



SPEAKER: Michael A. Hoonhout, Ph.D.,

Professor of Dogmatic Theology, Institution: St. Joseph's Seminary, Yonkers, NY **TOPIC:** "Reverence for God's Glory"

How great do you think God is? Do you consider God to be so glorious that you would be completely, eternally overwhelmed with awe were you to see Him? More importantly, what difference does the greatness of God make in your life right now? Do you regularly give Him proper praise, adoration, reverence, worship? In a culture that, if it is not denying His existence, is criticizing God for His short-comings, the general idea of God is too base, common and abstract to have much appeal to our minds and hearts. In his talk Professor Hoonhout will explain what the Bible means by the glory and greatness of God, why and how we are to worship and praise Him, and why greater reverence for divine majesty is so much needed today. Your present notion of God is too small; come this Monday night to discover the height and depth, length and breadth of God's all-surpassing mystery.



Confronting Arrogance

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Sirach 35:12-14, 16-18 The God of justice
- ► 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18 Reward for fidelity
- ▶ Luke 18:9-14 The pharisee and the tax collector

After the Gospel passage last week in which Jesus reminded his disciples that God hears the cries of those who call out to him "day and night" (like the widow in the parable), the first reading today makes the same point. God hears the cry of the weak, the oppressed, and the vulnerable. However, Sirach insists God shows "no favorites" and is a God of justice. Jesus will drive that point home in the Gospel reading, once again reminding his hearers that human ways are not always God's ways.

Immediately we know who Jesus' audience is in this Gospel reading: "those who were convinced of their own righteousness and despised everyone else," usually identified as the scribes and Pharisees. As in other places in the Gospels, Jesus is not shy about confronting arrogance and judgmentalism when he sees it. He consistently speaks to people what they need to hear, building them up when they have been beaten down by life, and taking people down a peg when they need that. Last week, his words offered encouragement for his followers to persist when life is difficult. This week it is a challenge

to those who think they have it all together and don't need God's mercy because they do everything right.

Ironically, the "prayer" of the Pharisee in this parable isn't really even directed at God. He is speaking to himself and telling God how well he compares to the sinful tax collector he notices out of the corner of his eye. He makes sure to boast, lest God has missed it, that his fasting and tithing go above and beyond what is required by Jewish law. So what is the point of his "prayer" anyway? What does he want from God? It doesn't

seem he has any need for God or anything from God. He is so full of himself and his own accomplishments; there is no room left in him for God. He goes home without receiving any gifts from God—because he doesn't think he needs any.

The tax collector, on the other hand, knows his life is a mess and knows he needs God's mercy. His prayer is addressed straight to God, without comparing himself to the Pharisee nearby. He focuses on his own

failures and asks for what he needs: mercy. Jesus tells us that he goes home having received the gift.

Questions of the Week

Which kind of message do you most need to hear from Jesus at this point in your life, encouragement or challenge? Or is there something else you need to hear more?

If you were to go to God in prayer today as honestly and humbly as the tax collector, what would you ask for?

Grieving as a Spiritual Exercise

In a remarkable book, *The Inner Voice of Love*, written while he was in a deep emotional depression, Henri Nouwen shares these words: "The great challenge is living your wounds through instead of thinking them through. It is better to cry than to worry, better to feel your wounds deeply than to try to understand them, better to let them enter into your silence than to talk about them. The choice you face constantly is whether you are taking your hurts to your head or to your heart. In your head you analyze them, find their causes and consequences, and coin words to speak and write about them. But no final healing is likely to come from that source. You need to let your wounds go down into your heart. Then you can live them through and discover that they will not destroy you. Your heart is greater than your wounds."

He's right; your heart is greater than your wounds, though it needs caution in dealing with them. Wounds can soften your heart; but they can also harden you heart and freeze it in bitterness. So what's the path here? What leads to warmth and what leads to coldness?

In a remarkable essay, *The Drama of the Gifted Child*, the Swiss psychologist, Alice Miller, tells us what hardens the heart and what softens it. She does so by outlining a particular drama that commonly unfolds in many lives. For her, giftedness does not refer to intellectual prowess but to sensitivity. The gifted child is the sensitive child. But that gift, sensitivity, is a mixed blessing. Positively, it lets you feel things more deeply so that the joys of living will mean more to you than to someone who is more callous. That's its upside.

Conversely, however, if you are sensitive you will habitually fear disappointing others and will forever fear not measuring up. And your inadequacy to always measure up will habitually trigger feelings of anxiety and guilt within you. As well, if you are extraordinarily sensitive, you will tend to be self-effacing to a fault, letting others have their way while you swallow hard as your own needs aren't met and then absorb the consequences. Not least, if you feel things deeply you will also feel hurt more deeply. That's the downside of sensitivity and makes for the drama that Alice Miller calls the "drama of the gifted child", the drama of the sensitive person.

Further, in her view, for many of us that drama will only begin to really play itself out in our middle and later years, constellating in frustration, disappointment, anger, and bitterness, as the wounds of our childhood and early adulthood begin to break through and overpower the inner mechanisms we have set up to resist them. In mid-life and beyond, our wounds will make themselves heard so strongly that our habitual ways of denial and coping no longer work. In mid-life you realize that your mother did love your sister better than you, that your father in fact didn't care much about you, and that all those hurts you absorbed because you swallowed hard and played the stoic are still gnawing away bitterly inside you. That's how the drama eventually culminates, in a heart that's angry.

So where does that leave us? For Alice Miller, the answer lies in grieving. Our wounds are real and there is nothing we can do about them, pure and simple. The clock can't be turned back. We cannot relive our lives so as to provide ourselves with different parents, different childhood friends, different experiences on the playground, different choices, and a different temperament. We can only move forward so as to live beyond our wounds. And we do that by grieving. Alice Miller submits that the entire psychological and spiritual task of midlife and beyond is that of grieving, mourning our wounds until the very foundations of our lives shake enough so that there can be transformation.

A deep psychological scar is the same as having some part of your body permanently damaged in an accident. You will never be whole again and nothing can change that. But you can be happy again; perhaps more happy than ever before. But that loss of wholeness must be grieved or it will manifest itself in anger, bitterness, and jealous regrets.

The Jesuit music composer and spiritual writer, Roc O'Connor, makes the same point, with the added comment that the grieving process also calls for a long patience within which we need to wait long enough so that the healing can occur according to its own natural rhythms. We need, he says, to embrace our wounded humanity and not act out. What's helpful, he suggests, is to grieve our human limitations. Then we can endure hunger, emptiness, disappointment, and humiliation without looking for a quick fix – or for a fix at all. We should not try to fill our emptiness too quickly without sufficient waiting.

And we won't ever make peace with our wounds without sufficient grieving.
