Joseph accepts the son as his own, not as a matter of biology, but as a matter of love and compassion, of trust and faith. #### Christmas 2019

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

In his December 1, 2019 Apostolic Letter Admirabile Signum: On the Meaning and Importance of the Nativity Scene, Our Holy Father Pope Francis writes:

"The nativity scene is like a living Gospel rising up from the pages of sacred Scripture...I wish to encourage the beautiful family tradition of preparing the nativity scene in the days before Christmas, but also the custom of setting it up in the workplace, in schools, hospitals, prisons and town squares.

Great imagination and creativity is always shown in employing the most diverse materials to create small masterpieces of beauty. As children, we learn from our parents and grandparents to carry on this joyful tradition, which encapsulates a wealth of popular piety. It is my hope that this custom will never be lost and that, wherever it has fallen into disuse, it can be discovered and revived."

The Holy Father captures so poignantly how we creatively share our Catholic faith generation to generation through the Nativity sets and creches that bring Christ's light and love into our homes, our parishes and our public squares.

He also captures how the poor, the outcast, the ignored, the forgotten and the vulnerable have a privileged place in every Nativity scene: "The presence of the poor and the lowly in the nativity scene remind us that God became man for the sake of those who feel most in need of his love and who ask him to draw near to them. Jesus, 'gentle and humble in heart' (Mt 11:29), was born in poverty and led a simple life in order to teach us to recognize what is essential and to act accordingly. The nativity scene clearly teaches that we cannot let ourselves be fooled by wealth and fleeting promises of happiness. We see Herod's palace in the background, closed and deaf to the tidings of joy. By being born in a manger, God himself launches the only true revolution that can give hope and dignity to the disinherited and the outcast: the revolution of love, the revolution of tenderness. From the manger, Jesus proclaims, in a meek yet powerful way, the need for sharing with the poor as the path to a more human and fraternal world in which no one is excluded or marginalized."

As we celebrate the joy of Christmas and the power and presence of the Prince of Peace in our families, in the Church and in the World, we realize at the same time that the Christmas Crib can never be separated from the agony of Calvary's Cross.

Even as we rejoice this Christmas of 2019, we remember and stand with the poor, the hungry, the addicted, the mentally ill, the global refugees and non-documented immigrants, and survivors of sexual abuse.

As we pray before the Christmas manger and see the beauty, the hope, the possibility in the birth of Jesus, we are compelled to remember that far too many children do not receive the welcome and joy they deserve for the miracle of their existence.

We cannot forget this Christmas season the great sadness that New York State, through the passage of the horrific Reproductive Health Act<sup>1</sup>, has enshrined into law the killing of innocent human beings through abortion up until the moment of actual birth and beyond, as this radical law permits the killing of those children who survive abortion.

Together, we invoke the power of the Prince of Peace and His compassionate Word found in the Beatitudes and in His call to serve the poor and the most vulnerable among us in Matthew 25. Our Lord gives us the courage and the voice as the Catholic Church in New York State and around the world to speak of the beauty, the sanctity and the dignity of every human life.

We will continue to be "a sign of contradiction" by witnessing relentlessly and courageously to the Gospel of Human Life. As is said in the first words of the *Didache*, the earliest known non-Scriptural Christian writing: "There are two Ways, one of Life and one of Death..." We will always stand with our earliest ancestors in the Christian faith in favor of the Way of Life and opposed to the Way of Death.

We will continue to seek the intercession of St. Thomas More, patron of statesmen, politicians and lawyers for the conversion of the public servants who have supported this tragic legislation.

The Cistercian biblical scholar Father Simeon writes: "The Child, while present only in Bethlehem by his poverty and weakness, is already present in the pattern of the constellations by his splendor and his glory."<sup>2</sup>

May our praise and glory of the Prince of Peace fill our hearts and homes and give us the courage and prayerful determination to bring the Joy of the Gospel and the Splendor of Truth to every public square in New York State and throughout the world.





### Anointing of the Sick

"By the sacred anointing of the sick and the prayer of the priests the whole Church commends those who are ill to the suffering and glorified Lord, that he may raise them up and save them. And indeed she exhorts them to contribute to the good of the People of God by freely uniting themselves to the passion and death of Christ."

(Catechism of the Catholic Church, #1499 - cf Lumen Gentium 11)

#### A Little Background

Sickness is part of our human condition. God is present to us in times of illness as well as in times of health. God desires our well being, which has many aspects. Throughout his life, Jesus reached out to those who were ill. Jesus offered comfort and healing to the ill. Sometimes that healing included physical healing, but that was not the only or even the primary aspect of his healing. While God does not will our suffering, we can find ways of growing and learning through suffering that can bring us closer to God. By acting as Jesus did, by reaching out to those who are sick, by offering comfort, assistance, prayer for healing the whole person, we become united with those who are ill and with God.

Think of some of the actions used when a person is sick.

Often, touch is very important. Have you ever placed your hand on an aching head or shoulder or back? Have you ever rubbed ointment onto an aching muscle, or sponged off a fevered body? We see Jesus using touch in his comfort of the sick, and certain of those actions have become rituals associated with this sacrament that celebrates God's love for the sick person and God's desire for healing of the whole person.

In the New Testament, in the letter of James, we find the early Christian community aware that the healing desire and power of Jesus is still present. "Is there anyone sick among you? That one should ask for the elders of the church. They in turn are to pray over the sick person, anointing the person with oil in the name of the Lord." (James 5:14-15)

Here we find the roots of the sacrament we know as the Anointing of the Sick. During the early centuries of the church, there was no formal rite for anointing, but blessed oil was used to sign the senses and the laying on of hands was common.



"From ancient times in the liturgical traditions of both East and West, we have testimonies to the practice of anointings of the sick with blessed oil. Over the centuries the Anointing of the Sick was conferred more and more exclusively on those at the point of death. Because of this it received the name "Extreme Unction". (CCC #1512)

This perception of the sacrament lasted well into the 20<sup>th</sup> century, and indeed, today many people still have that perception. The Second Vatican Council called for the revision of this rite of anointing, incorporating the understanding we have gained about its origins.

The new rite, as with all the other sacramental revisions, emphasizes the role of the community. The community is called on not only to pray for the sick, but to pray with the sick. We are interdependent. We can do much for those who are ill, but they do for us as well. We share with each other. Anyone involved in healthcare professions or who has cared for a loved one knows the mutuality involved in that caring relationship.

The new rite also makes clear that this sacrament is intended not only for those who are dying, but for those who face serious illness but are not facing death. This includes those with chronic illness, those facing surgery, those dealing with illness other than physical, those becoming frail from illness or age. With this understanding, it is clear that a person may celebrate this sacrament more than once, though there are guidelines to help discern when celebrating

To think about...Were you ever present when someone else was anointed? What was it like to be present to that person at that time? How might we strengthen the community connection with those who are ill?

### A Holy, Human Family

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Sirach 3:2-6, 12-14 Duties toward parents
- ► Colossians 3:12-21 The practice of virtues
- ► Matthew 2:13-15, 19-23 The flight to Egypt

With the story of Jesus' birth still fresh in our minds on this first Sunday after Christmas, the church uses the opportunity to celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family with all of the readings focused on families. The Gospel readings are from Matthew this year, so the focus this week is on Jesus' earthly father, Joseph. (When we read from the Gospel of Luke, the focus is on his mother, Mary.)

If the story of Jesus' birth warmed our hearts with its tale of the star over Bethlehem and the magi who traveled long distances to worship and bring him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, the story today takes a terrible turn. Mary and Joseph have no time to savor his birth or let the wonder of the magi's visit sink in because suddenly their baby's life is in danger. Like millions of refugees throughout history, they must flee their home country on short notice with just a vague sense of a distant destination. Because they trust the guidance the angel gave Joseph in a dream, they save their son's life.

Tragically, however, many families lost sons to Herod's cruelty when he ordered all baby boys killed in his efforts to kill Jesus. (These verses are omitted from the Gospel passage today.) So the Feast of the Holy Family is not "The Feast of the Perfect Family in a Perfect World." The Church celebrates this family today because of Mary and Joseph's willingness to say "yes" to raising God's son, even though it brought them great fear, anxiety, uncertainty, and even anguish because

of the evil one man, Herod, wreaked on so many families. They were a holy family, but

they did not escape any challenges of being a human family.

### Deep Incarnation – Another Meaning of Christmas

Some years ago at a religious conference a man approached the microphone and after apologizing for what he felt would be an inappropriate question, asked this: "I love my dog. When he dies will he go to heaven? Do animals have eternal life?"

The answer to that might come as a surprise to many of us, but, looked at through the eyes of Christian faith, yes, his dog can go to heaven. It's one of the meanings of Christmas. God came into the world to save the world, not just the people living in it. The incarnation has meaning for humanity, but also for the cosmos itself. We don't know exactly what that means, and our imaginations aren't up to the task of picturing it, but, because of the incarnation, dogs too can go to heaven. Is this fanciful? No, it's scriptural teaching.

At Christmas was celebrate the birth of Jesus and see in his birth the beginning of the mystery of the incarnation unfolding in history, the mystery of God becoming human in physical flesh in order to save the world. What we tend to struggle with though is how we understand what's meant by Christ saving the world. Most of us take that to mean that Christ came into the world to save the people, those of us with self-awareness and eternal souls.

That's true, but our faith also asks us to believe that God's saving activity in the Christ extends to more than only human beings and more than even animals and other living things. God's saving activity in Christ reaches so deep that it saves creation itself – the oceans, the mountains, the soil that grows our food, the desert sands, and the earth itself. Christ came to save all of those things too, not just us, the people.

Where, you might ask, does scripture teach this? It teaches it most everywhere in implicit ways though it teaches it quite explicitly in a number of different places. For example, in the Epistle to the Romans (8, 19-22) St. Paul writes: I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us. For the creation waits in eager expectation for the children of God to be revealed. For the creation was subjected to frustration, not by its own choice, but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that creation itself will be liberated from its bondage to decay and brought into the freedom and glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the present time.

This may come as a surprise to us since, until quite recently, our preaching and catechesis has not often made this explicit. However what St. Paul is saying here is that physical creation itself, the cosmic world, will, at the end of time, be transformed in some glorious way and enter into heaven, just as human beings do. He's also saying that, like us, it too somehow senses its mortality and groans to be set free from its present limits.

We need to ask ourselves this question? What do we believe will happen to physical creation at the end of time? Will it be destroyed, burnt-up, annihilated? Or, will it simply be abandoned and left empty and deserted like a stage after a play has ended, while we go on to life elsewhere? Scripture informs us otherwise, that is, it tells us that physical creation itself, our planet earth, will also be transformed ("liberated from its bondage to decay") and enter into heaven with us. How will this happen? We can't imagine it, just as we can't imagine our own transformed state. But scripture assures us that it will happen because, like ourselves, our world, physical creation, is also destined to die, and, like us, it intuits its mortality and groans under that sentence, aching to be set free from its limitations and become immortal.

Science agrees. It tells us that physical creation is mortal, that the sun is burning out, that energy is ever-so-slowly decreasing and that the earth as we know it will someday die. The earth is as mortal as we are and so if it's to have a future it needs to be saved by Something or Someone from outside itself. That Something and Someone are revealed in the mystery of the incarnation within which God takes on physical flesh in Christ in order to save the world – and what he came to save was not just us, the people living on this earth, but rather, "the world", the planet itself, and everything on it.

Jesus assured us that nothing is ever ultimately lost. No hair falls from someone's head and no sparrow falls from the sky and simply disappears forever, as if it had never been. God created, loves, cares for, and ultimately resurrects every bit of creation for all eternity – including a beloved dog.



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
