Father Tom's Words for the Week

Dear Friends,

In Today's gospel, Jesus invites us to change conflicts into opportunities for forgiveness. He is guiding us to co-create with God a world without violence. Fr. Jude Siciliano, OP, reflects on this message.

"But I say to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you...." When we face an opponent we ready ourselves for conflict – if not physical, then oral. Jesus is instructing us to change our world by turning an enemy into a friend. That's risky business and leaves us vulnerable. But using force and coercion will never accomplish the realm Jesus has in mind when he speaks of the presence of the kingdom of heaven in our midst....

Jesus also says: turn the other cheek, go the extra mile, give your cloak to the one who wants to take you to court for your tunic. Well, no one expects that kind of behavior "in the real world." Maybe that's Jesus' point – use your imaginations, do the unexpected to break down conflict and create the possibilities for a relationship....

Granted that turning the other cheek and going the extra mile are not strategies that always work. Jesus is offering these as alternative ways to respond when one meets force or coercion. He suggests that doing the unexpected just might break the cycle of violence between one doing the offense and the offended. There is more than one way to respond in conflict situations. We can reciprocate with more violence, or use our imaginations to try other, more relationship-building possibilities...

Here's a little story: A beggar had been sitting by the side of the road for over 30 years. One day a stranger walked by. "Spare some change?", mumbled the beggar, mechanically holding out his old baseball cap. "I have nothing to give you", said the stranger. Then he asked, "what are you sitting on?" "Nothing," replied the beggar. "Just an old box. I have been sitting on it for a long time, so long I can't remember". "Have a look inside," said the stranger. "No," said the beggar. "What's the point? There's nothing in there". "Have a look inside" insisted the stranger. The beggar managed to pry open the lid. With astonished disbelief and elation he saw that the box was filled with gold.

What's the point of the story? I encourage each of us to set aside the following days: March 16, 17 and 18, to be given a new look, a 2020 glimpse at what St Paul means when he writes of you: "you are God's work of art, created in Christ." We are most fortunate to have Father Richard Fragomeni, a well-known and revered international scholar and retreat master coming to SSPJ to lead us in a Lenten mission. It promises to be *Extraordinary!* Be sure to spread the word. The morning session following the 9:15 Mass will be an adult education opportunity which will not be the same as the evening mission.

If you haven't yet called in for Mardi Gras, please be sure to do so ASAP. The evening begins with a brief prayer service at 5:55pm sharp at the doors of the school. At that time we will burn the palms brought from last year's Palm Sunday celebration.

The Lenten Soup Supper precedes the 7pm Ash Wednesday Mass.

Apostles: We Who Are Sent...Hope: God's constant gift of new possibilities



LENT 2020

Dear Friends:

The season of Lent offers us a sacred time for contemplating what it means to accompany Our Lord as he carries the Cross.

During his Passion, we see Christ laboring under the burden of our sufferings and of those whom we love. As the prophet Isaiah says, "He has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows" (cf. Is 53:4), and he still carries them today. Perhaps this year we might pray for the grace to accompany more closely our neighbors and loved ones who are suffering, and so participate in Christ's own sacrificial love as he shoulders their burdens.

Throughout our Diocese there are many who are suffering. We know this. Every parish has its stories of families experiencing hardship and loss. Our hospitals and shelters have their stories. Our nursing homes and schools have theirs. Indeed, we find the Cross in our own homes. Our parents and grandparents know heartache, and our children have burdens as well. Our Lord carries them all.

Perhaps you know a person who is sick or grieving the loss of a loved one. Maybe you know someone who is suffering from addiction or depression and is tempted to despair. Perhaps you know of someone who is lonely or has been altogether abandoned. It is good to remember that Our Lord is carrying each of them already with great love, placing his sheep on his shoulders (cf. Lk 15:5). And this Good Shepherd invites us to accompany him in holiness that we might share more fully in his mission.

Consider the figure of Simon of Cyrene. We know him from the Fifth Station of the Cross and from the Synoptic Gospels. He was compelled to carry the Cross of Christ (cf. Mt 27:32; Mk 15:21; Lk 23:26). We recognize his initial fear; it is the same as our own. We do not fault Simon for his resistance. Helping Jesus could not have been easy. And yet with God's grace what began as servitude was transformed into a gesture of compassion, even a sublime privilege.

To be sure, we may have cause to be fearful of accompanying Christ under the Cross. Social stigmas associated with some sufferings may cause us to stay away. We might fear our own inadequacies; weaknesses and wounds can cause self-doubt. We may even feel some degree of responsibility for the person's suffering: "I could have done more". Simon would have experienced these fears as Christ was passing by. Indeed, he needed to be driven by the Roman soldiers to accompany Jesus (cf. Mk 15:21). But the gaze of Christ prevailed on Simon and moved him beyond his fear.

Christ himself prayed in the garden before taking up the Cross, "Father if it be possible, let this cup pass", but he saw the Father's love for humanity and was moved to pray, "yet not as I will, but as you will" (cf. Mt 26:39). Love bends the will to the other. It was Christ's love that changed Simon's servitude into sacrifice. And it is Christ's love that can transform our fear into accompaniment.

As your bishop, I have the privilege of seeing that so many of you are already living as Simon, already accompanying Christ who carries the burdens of your neighbors and loved ones. I visit your homes and pray with you in your parishes. I witness your dedication to the people of your ministries and organizations. And I see that many of you, like Simon, allow the gaze of Christ to draw you underneath the weight of the Cross, where your own servitude becomes a privileged encounter with Father, Son, and Holy Spirit and an encouragement to us all.

In light of this witness, I wish to bring particular attention to the newly formed Morning Star Initiative, designed to revitalize Catholic elementary school education on Long Island. I ask all of you to pray for our parishes and schools, our administrators and teachers, our students and their families, and all who are promoting a bold new era of Catholic education and evangelization on Long Island.

This way of sharing in the life of Christ moves us beyond imitation into a real participation with him in his relationship with the Father. The Cross is not a punishment to be endured; it is a decision to love. "He was pierced for our transgressions. He was crushed for our iniquities" (cf. Is 53:5). And when we move in this way toward others in their need, our experience of their suffering is transformed from a burden into an encounter with love. We find, with Simon, that our servitude becomes a mysterious privilege of accompaniment. Underneath the weight of a cross carried with love, we see Jesus.

Too often we feel regret for not drawing near to those who are suffering. Let us pray during this holy season, this season of conversion, for the grace to recognize the gaze of Christ in those who are suffering and to respond to his invitation to share in his Cross. In this way, the Church on Long Island will grow together with Our Lord in grace.

Lenten Regulations 2020

Traditionally, the Lenten Season is a time of penance throughout the Catholic Church. Lent is a season in which prayer, the reception of the sacraments, charity and almsgiving are emphasized. Fast and abstinence are to be observed Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. All Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday:

These are days of *Fast and Abstinence from meat*. There is a limit of one full meal on these days for all between the ages of 18 and 59 inclusive.

Days of Abstinence: (All Fridays in Lent):

All who have reached their 14th year are bound to abstain totally from meat.



Accepting Limitations

This Week's Readings at Mass


- ► Genesis 2:7-9; 3:1-7 The fall of humankind
- ► Romans 5:12-19 Humanity's sin through Adam
- ▶ Matthew 4:1-11 The temptation of Jesus

As we move into this Lenten season of penitence, the readings for this first Sunday revolve around the themes of temptation and sin. The first reading recounts the story of the "Fall" of the first man and woman in the Garden of Eden. The second reading reflects back on that story. The Gospel reading, on the other hand, gives a glimpse of how we might be tempted yet remain faithful to God as Jesus was. It is as if Jesus' obedience brings the first story full circle, giving us hope that we aren't all doomed to give in to temptations to do what is wrong.

Between the first reading from Genesis when Adam and Eve eat the fruit they aren't supposed to eat, and the Gospel reading of Jesus resisting extreme temptations in his hunger and exhaustion, we are given two examples of how to deal with our own temptations. Adam and Eve were seemingly set up for an easy, blissful life with all they needed and more at their disposal. Yet the slightest suggestion from the serpent that they shouldn't be limited in what they had or in their power and knowledge was all it took for them to decide they knew better than God. How often we give in so easily when presented with options for more things even though we already have enough!

On the other hand, Jesus was in extreme physical need when he resisted the devil's temptations to feed himself

and claim power. He had more reasons to give in, and most of us would be understanding if he did. But rather than grasp at physical comfort, reassurance, and strength, he chose to remain vulnerable and humble, even frail. When God became human in Jesus, he chose to be fully human and endure human

limitations, from his 40 days in the desert all the way through to his agonizing death.

What is the lesson here then? Perhaps it is about not grasping for more things, more power, or more security, but trusting we will be cared for, even in our vulnerabilities and need. Jesus accepted and lived with his human limitations. Certainly, it's uncomfortable and oftentimes outright painful to have physical, emotional, and intellectual limits as we live out our lives in imperfect bodies in an imperfect world. God isn't a masochist who wants us to be in pain and need, any more than God wanted that for Jesus, but Jesus shows us there is dignity in being limited, and there is strength in needing God.

Speaking with Authority

We are growing ever more distrustful of words. Everywhere we hear people say: "That's just talk! That's nothing but empty words!"

And empty words are all around us. Our world is full of lies, of false promises, of glittering advertising that doesn't deliver, of words never backed up by anything. We trust less and less in what we hear. We've been lied to and betrayed far too often, now we're cautious about what we believe.

But distrust in the words we hear is only one way in which our spoken word is weak. Our words can be truthful and still have little power. Why? Because, to use Gospel terms, we may not be speaking with much *authority*. Our words may not have what they need to back them up. What's meant by this?

The Gospels tells us that one of things that distinguished Jesus for the other religious preachers of his time was that he spoke with *authority*, while they didn't. What gives words authority? What gives them transformative power?

There are, as we know, different kinds of power. There's a power that flows from strength and energy. We see this, for example, in the body of a gifted athlete who moves with authority. There's power too in charisma, in a gifted speaker or a rock star. They too speak with a certain authority and power. But there's still another kind of power and authority, one very different in kind from that of the athlete and the rock star. There's the power of a baby, the paradoxical power of vulnerability, innocence, and helplessness. Powerlessness is sometimes the real power. If you put an athlete, a rock star, and a baby into the same room, who among them is the most powerful? Who has the most authority? Whatever the power of the athlete or the rock star, the baby has more power to change hearts.

The Gospel texts which tell us that Jesus spoke with "authority" never suggest that he spoke with "great energy" or "powerful charisma". In describing Jesus' authority they use the word "exousia", a Greek word for which we don't have an English equivalent. What's "exousia"? We don't have a term for it, but we have a concept: "Exousia" might be described as the combination of vulnerability, innocence, and helplessness that a baby brings into a room. Its very helplessness, innocence, and vulnerability have a unique authority and power to touch your conscience. It's for good reason that people watch their language around a baby. Its very presence is cleansing.

But there are a couple of other elements too undergirding the authority with which Jesus spoke. His vulnerability and innocence gave his words a special power, yes; but two other elements also made his words powerful: His words were always grounded in the integrity of his life. As well, people recognized that his authority was not coming from him but from something (Someone) higher whom he was serving. There was no discrepancy between his words and his life. Moreover, his words were powerful because they weren't just coming from him, they were coming through him from Someone above him, Someone whose authority couldn't be challenged, God.

You see this kind of authority; for example, in persons like Mother Teresa and Jean Vanier. Their words had a special authority. Mother Teresa could meet someone for the first time and ask him or her to come to India and work with her. Jean Vanier could do the same. A friend of mine shares how on meeting Vanier for the first time, in their very first conversation, Vanier invited him to become a missionary priest. That thought had never before crossed his mind. Today he's a missionary.

What gives some people that special power? "Exousia", a selfless life, and a grounding in an authority that comes from above. What you see in persons like Mother Teresa and Jean Vanier is the powerlessness of a baby, combined with a selfless life, grounded in an authority beyond them. When such persons speak, like Jesus', their words have real power to calm hearts, heal them, change them and, metaphorically and really, cast out demons from them.

But we don't always have to look to spiritual giants like Mother Teresa and Jean Vanier to see this. Most of us have not been so personally influenced by Mother Teresa or Jean Vanier, but have been spoken to with authority by people around us. In my case, it was my father and mother who spoke to me with that kind of authority. As well some of the Ursuline nuns who taught me in school and some of my uncles and aunts had the power to ask sacrifice of me because they spoke with "exousia" and with an integrity and a faith that I could not question or deny. They asked me to consider becoming a priest and I became one.

What moves the world is often the powerful energy and charisma of the highly talented; but the heart is moved by a different kind of authority.
