Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

OUR LENTEN MISSION HAS BEEN CANCELLED. Fr. Fragomeni, who was to lead the mission, contacted me and said that in light of the coronavirus situation, it would be better to not ask people to come to additional public gatherings at this time. We will be reworking schedules and hope to have him lead a retreat next Lenten season.

Today we celebrate the third Sunday of Lent. We hear the familiar, dynamic and complex story of "the woman at the well". As we travel through our Lenten desert, we can identify with her thirst – a thirst which she realizes goes far beyond physical thirst. Her encounter with Jesus fills her with "living water", and living water needs to be shared.

Fr. Jude Siciliano, OP, notes:

The Samaritan woman is a model for us. What she has received and discovered in Christ she can't wait to rush off to tell her townspeople. She knows who they are; she also knows they are thirsty and looking for water too. Ours is a missionary faith. We cannot keep to ourselves what we have discovered in Jesus.

Like the woman, we also know the thirsts of people close to us, those whose thirsts only Jesus can quench. They probably have worded their thirsts to us: "I am lonely." "My wife died last month." "Religion has dried up for me." "I know I must have some purpose in life, but I don't know what it is." Etc. When they tell us these things they are talking to the right person, for we too have been thirsty. But we knew where to go -- we went to the well and found Jesus already there and we drank deeply of the living waters he gave us.

The Samaritan woman at the well was an Apostle of Hope. She shared her "living water" with others. We too can share – sometimes in words, but often by actions. Quoting St. Francis, "Preach the gospel always. Use words if necessary." Our actions may be big or small – bite-size ways of bringing hope. God thirsts for each of us! And we thirst for God. We come to the well from varied backgrounds. We seek to quench our thirsts. Like the woman at the well, we are to share what we have been given. We've committed to be Apostles of Hope.

Last Saturday's "Magic of Ireland" party was also a touch of heaven. Many, many thanks to Clare Farrell and Marianne Koke, the Co-chairs of the event and their hardworking committee which includes, Maria Inserra, Janet Garvey, Joan Shank, Diane Bleggi, Noel Rannazzisi and Clair Zito. Their dedication is truly a blessing to our parish. It certainly was clear how much work went into creating such a wonderful time. We need more helping hands! Remember the motto, "Many hands make light work"? We're already planning a follow up Oktoberfest. Might you join the committee? If so, please contact the Parish Center at 631-584-5454 leaving your name and number.

A special thank you to all who have already contributed to the Catholic Ministries Appeal. Your generosity helps our brothers and sisters who are carrying heavy crosses, to see the hope and light that comes from your compassion and prayers. Thus far our pledges represent 52% of our goal of \$111,000. Our payments are currently at 27% of goal. Parishes do not receive their rebate until payments received are equal to the parish goal. A Message from Father Tom~

In view of the concern for the containment of the coronavirus, I thought it advisable to keep you posted as to our policies to safeguard all who enter our church and facilities.

We have had a long-standing policy for sanitizing and cleaning all facilities. We use a disinfectant which as it cleans kills germs. It is a product that is recommended by the Suffolk County Health Department.

Due to the current health crisis, we have heightened our cleaning procedures even further by such efforts as all doorknobs, handrails, light switches, toilets, sinks, dispensers are being disinfected every day. Floors are always cleaned with disinfectant. All classrooms and offices are and will continue to be supplied with disinfectant wipes and sprays. Gloves are also available in these locations.

As you know in Church we have eliminated the distribution of the Precious Blood. We have requested people to not receive the host on the tongue at this time. We have discontinued the sign of peace and have requested that people do not hold hands during the Our Father.

If anyone is feeling ill they should stay home, as there is no obligation for them to attend Mass.

We are continuing our practice of having individual packets of hand cleaner available at the sign in book for all EM's and strongly recommend that each EM take a packet to their pew to be utilized right before they proceed into the sanctuary. We also have dispensers outside the bathrooms in the church as well as in the auditorium.

Lenten Regulations 2020

Traditionally, the Lenten Season is a time of penance throughout the Catholic Church. Lent is a season in which prayer, the reception of the sacraments, charity and almsgiving are emphasized. Fast and abstinence are to be observed Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. All Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday:

These are days of *Fast and Abstinence from meat*. There is a limit of one full meal on these days for all between the ages of 18 and 59 inclusive.

Days of Abstinence: (All Fridays in Lent):

All who have reached their 14th year are bound to abstain totally from meat.

It has been a Lenten tradition to pray the Stations of the Cross as a community on Friday evenings during Lent.

As we continue the tradition this year, we will focus on connecting the cross and suffering of Jesus with the crosses and sufferings so many may be experiencing in life.

Our Stations are simple and low-key, taking about a half hour.



COUNCIL'S CORNER

This month the Business Manager, Virginia Portanova, was invited to attend the Council meeting to inform them of her responsibilities and role in the parish. Virginia provided the following outline of her responsibilities.

A few years ago, the parish and the school were separate. We combined them in an effort to save money. Instead of having two business offices, we have one. The parish is responsible for the business aspect of the school, budgeting and paying the bills and things like that. In summary her responsibility are the budgets for both the school and parish and keeping them on tract for that budget.

She also keeps tract of the Sunday collections and reduces the budget to where it stands with the collections. We are trying to find ways to increase the revenues.

The payroll has been decreased as a cost saving measure as the collections have gone down. We have been able to reduce the payroll by a significant amount because of volunteers who provide over 110 hours per week of service time.

We have reduced office hours to save money. We used to be open 7 days a week until 8:00pm every night. Now we are open Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday while Religious Education classes are being held until 8:00pm; Thursday the office is only open to 5:00pm; Friday the office is officially closed although we are in the office catching up on various tasks; Saturday the office is open from 10:00-2:00pm and on Sunday the office is closed.

Virginia said she does not believe that the parish has suffered due to the changes that have been made such as reduction in staffing. We really do run a completely skeleton staff. Our payroll is down \$120,000 per year. Our expenses are down \$150,000 per year. We really do monitor. The parish has a great office staff that all share that sentiment, and everybody does watch the dollars and where we can cut or save without sacrificing the programs we have. We are existing as we always have. Nothing is being short changed. Religious Education is functioning the way it should. Everything is getting done.

Virginia said we have a \$3.5 million-dollar corporation between the church and school and does not believe most people realize that. Members of Council complimented Virginia on an outstanding job.

We have increased security for religious education classes which we never had before. So, while we have cut in areas of the budget, we also have increased in areas that needed to be.

Virginia said right now we are worried about the coronavirus, so we are doing extra precautionary steps such as sanitizing the handrails, doorknobs, light switches, etc. every day, As an example, she mentioned that after the Magic of Ireland on Saturday night, the crew came in and completely cleaned and sanitized the entire auditorium and kitchen, and bathrooms. We have been trying to stay on top of it and we have been fortunate in the school this year because of our practices that the school kids have not been sick and things like the flu have not gone around.

MARCH COUNCILS CORNER CONTINUED

After Virginia left the meeting, there was a discussion of the current policy of having the hand sanitizer packets available for EM's and a recommendation that the EM's be compelled to utilize them before proceeding into the sanctuary. Father Tom said that has been the policy for several years. Father Tom said that he will remind the EM's that this is our policy.

Father Tom said people have been pretty responsive to our request to consider not receiving the host on the tongue at this time. They are complying with that request.

Father Tom said due to the coronavirus crisis, we have had to cancel our Parish Lenten Mission. The good news is Father Fragomeni will be able to come next year. Father Tom said although he was disappointed he fully understood. Fr. Fragomeni initiated the call and said it would be a very negative signal to ask people to come out an additional time other than to Mass on Sunday. He also had cancelled a retreat he was going to give in Rochester for the same reason.

It was noted that the custodial staff was doing an excellent job in maintaining and sanitizing the buildings and facilities.

Father provided a brief parish update. Mardi Gras and Lenten Soup Supper went very well. The Magic of Ireland also went very well and provided a profit of \$18,000 to the parish. Father said that the two Chairs and their committee only want to do it for one more year. They have suggested that a new way of doing things would be to get people to commit for a two-year commitment. They would train and mentor the people for the next two years and then they in turn would train others for the following two years. Father said he has already spoken to the Principal about getting people from the school and Father Tom will try to get people from Religious Education. It is a wonderful community builder and people had a great time at the event.






This Week's Readings at Mass

- ▶ 1 Samuel 16:1b, 6-7, 10-13a Samuel anoints David
- ► Ephesians 5:8-14 Duty to live in the light
- ► John 9:1-41 The man born blind

All three readings today delve into themes of seeing and not seeing, light and darkness. In the passage from Samuel, God says clearly, "Not as man sees does God see, because man sees the appearance, but the Lord looks into the heart" (1 Sam 16:7). Without using the same words, Jesus reinforces the same teaching in the Gospel when he treats the blind man with compassion and inclusion rather than as the sinner who many supposed him to be. Like Samuel anointing Jesse's youngest son rather than his older brothers, Jesus turns social protocol upside down, uplifting the lowly and dismissing the powerful. St. Paul picks up on this, reminding his readers to "live as children of the light" and expose evil by bringing it into the light, something Jesus did when he called out the hypocrisy of the Pharisees.

The Gospel today gives us a perfect example of two contrasting responses to an unexpected gift or revelation. We can be curious, open, and accepting, like the man born blind, or we can dig in, stay skeptical, and stubbornly refuse to accept grace, as the Pharisees did. The Pharisees absolutely refuse to believe something they can't understand with their rational minds. They close themselves to anything which doesn't fit into their narrow categories, i.e., if someone does work on the Sabbath—even healing work—he must be a sinner. They have come to a judgment, and they refuse to entertain any new possibility. On the other hand, the man born blind is open to

new possibilities even though they don't make sense intellectually. "This is what is so amazing... it is unheard of that anyone ever opened the eyes of a person born blind." (Jn 9:30, 32). Yes, he has questions, but he is open to having his mind opened and changed just as his eyes are opened.



"Not as man sees does God see."

Sheepish Question:

How can I broaden my perspective to view life around me with the eyes of God?

The entire story is a reminder that God's ways are not always our ways and that we are called to be open to the possibility that God's activity will transcend what we thought we knew. We often think in terms of limitations: this person isn't capable of that, this illness is terminal, I will never heal from this emotional wound. Yet this story challenges our assumptions about what is possible and what isn't. Are we willing to be surprised by something unexpected and accept the gifts, or have we decided that God can't work in a new way?

Questions of the Week

When have you had an experience of goodness breaking through in a situation when you didn't expect it?

Where are you feeling stuck in darkness or blindness and need Christ's light to break through to you?

Judgment Day

We all fear judgment. We fear being seen with all that's inside us, some of which we don't want exposed to the light. Conversely, we fear being misunderstood, of not being seen in the full light, of not being seen for who we are. And what we fear most perhaps is final judgment, the ultimate revelation of ourselves. Whether we are religious or not, most of us fear having to one day face our Maker, judgment day. We fear standing naked in complete light where nothing's hidden and all that's in the dark inside us is brought to light.

What's curious about these fears is that we fear both being known for who we are, even as we fear not being known for who we really are. We fear judgment, even as we long for it. Perhaps that's because we already intuit what our final judgement will be and how it will take place. Perhaps we already intuit that when we finally stand naked in God's light we will also finally be understood and that revealing light will not just expose our shortcomings but also make visible our virtues.

That intuition is divinely-placed in us and reflects the reality of our final judgment. When all our secrets are known our secret goodness will also be known. Light exposes everything. For example, here's how the renowned poet and spiritual writer, Wendell Berry, foresees the final judgment: "I might imagine the dead waking, dazed into a shadowless light in which they know themselves altogether for the first time. It is a light that is merciless until they accept its mercy; by it, they are at once condemned and redeemed. It is Hell until it is Heaven. Seeing themselves in that light, if they are willing, they see how far they have failed the only justice of loving one another. And yet, in suffering the light's awful clarity, in seeing themselves within it, they see its forgiveness and its beauty and are consoled."

In many ways, this wonderfully captures it: When, one day, we stand in the full light of God, stripped naked in soul, morally defenseless, with everything we have ever done exposed, that light will, I suspect, indeed be a bit of hell before it turns into heaven. It will expose all that's selfish and impure inside us and all the ways we have hurt others in our selfishness, even as it will expose its opposite, namely, all that's selfless and pure inside us. That judgment will bring with it a certain condemnation even as it brings at the same time an understanding, forgiveness, and consolation such as we have never known before. That judgment will be, as Berry suggests, momentarily bitter but ultimately consoling.

The one nuance that I would add to Berry's idea is a something taken from Karl Rahner. Rahner's fantasy of our judgment by God after death is very similar to Berry's, except that, for Rahner, the agent of that judgment will not so much be God's light as it will be God's love. For Rahner, the idea is not so much that we will be standing in an unrelenting light that sears and pierces through us, but rather that we will be embraced by a love so unconditional, so understanding, and so gracious that, inside that, we will know instantly all that's selfish and impure inside us even as we know all that's pure and selfless. Therese of Lisieux used to ask God for forgiveness with these words: "Punish me with a kiss!" Judgment day will be exactly that. We will be "punished" by a kiss, by being loved in a way that will make us painfully aware of the sin within us, even as it lets us know that we are good and loveable.

For those of us who are Roman Catholics, this notion of judgment is also, I believe, what we mean by our concept of purgatory. Purgatory is not a place that's separate from heaven where one goes for a time to do penance for one's sins and to purify one's heart. Our hearts are purified by being embraced by God, not by being separated from God for a time so as to be made worthy of that embrace. As well, as Therese of Lisieux implies, the punishment for our sin is in the embrace itself. Final judgment takes place by being unconditionally embraced by Love. When that happens to the extent that we're sinful and selfish that embrace of pure goodness and love will make us painfully aware of our own sin and that will be *hell until it is heaven*.

As a lyric by Leonard Cohen puts it: *Behold the gates of mercy, in arbitrary space, and none of us deserving the cruelty or the grace.* He's right. None of us deserves either the cruelty or the grace we experience in this world. And only our final judgment, the embrace of unconditional love, God's kiss, will make us aware both of how cruel we've been and how good we really are.
