Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

Today we celebrate the second Sunday in Ordinary Time. The Christmas season came to an end last Sunday on the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. As we move on from celebration, how will we return to our everyday lives? Here are some thoughts from Fr. Jude Siciliano, OP:

*Well, we do have to get back to our lives, to the ordinary. We will again be numbering these Sundays "ordinary time" – based on the Latin that means counting. But the English still sounds "ordinary," as in routine, boring and plain. **The question is: has the Christmas season reminded us that we have a "Reason for the Season"? Now that Christ has arrived, how do we get him into our daily lives?***

The world around us has, once again, put Christmas aside. But let's not leave the Christmas season too quickly. We pause and play it all back again, noticing how God has been the key player this season, as in all seasons. The real gift comes from God....

Notice, after the manifestation, the Magi must return "by another route." Already the gift of God has begun to change their lives and ours as well. Having experienced the birth of the Savior, nothing can be the same for us, we have to return to our lives "by another route." We have to take what we have experienced back to our families and world, as people who have experienced a life-altering event. A light has shone, "the glory of the Lord shines upon you." We see things in a different way; light shines in our lives and we interpret the events, the difficulties as well as the joys, under the new vision we have from that light.

Pope Francis has designated the Third Sunday of Ordinary Time as Sunday of the Word of God, when all Catholics should give special reference to the Sacred Word both individually and collectively as members of parishes. He says "devoting a specific Sunday of the liturgical year to the word of God can enable the church to experience anew how the risen Lord opens up for us the treasury of his word and enables us to proclaim its unfathomable riches before the world."

The first celebration of the special new day on the liturgical calendar is next Sunday, January 26, 2020. On that day we would like to do to accentuate the Word of God, incensing the Book of Gospels and carrying it in a solemn procession, accompanied by an extended sung gospel acclamation. Following the homily, the people at Mass will be invited to come forward to reverence the Book of Gospels- similar to the way the cross is revered on Good Friday. The Book of Gospels will then be placed on display in the sanctuary. At home everyone is encouraged to place the Bible in a prominent place of honor and to read from it before meals.

January 26th is also the beginning of Catholic Schools Week. We encourage you to come in to take a look at our amazing school! There's an Open House on Sunday, January 26th, after the 10 o'clock Mass until one thirty. Another Open House will be held on Thursday, January 30th. Please check the bulletin for more info.

This week Father Kevin Cronin, OFM, our friendly Friar, will be filling in for me while I try to capture and bring back some sunshine and warm weather for you!


Things You Should Know!

COUNCIL'S CORNER

This month, Lynn Sisti, the Coordinator for Parish Social Ministry, was invited to the Council meeting to provide a report on the activities involving the Ministry. There are many different facets in PSM.

Food Pantry - Lynn said that many people are under the impression that the food pantry is the focus of social ministry. She explained that it is really a very small part. We do have a group of people to whom we provide bags of food every week.

Consolation Ministry -The biggest responsibility is the Consolation Ministry. Lynn explained that the consolation ministers meet with the family when they have lost a loved one. Sometimes it is at the funeral home or their own home. The minister discusses the funeral preparation, the prayers and the hymns and provide some comfort to the families. She has received many telephone calls and notes from families saying how wonderful the consolation ministers are.

Cake Bakers -Part of the consolation ministry also involves cake bakers who bring cakes to the families about 2-3 weeks after the funeral. She also sends cards with a note for three months to the bereaved family just to let them know that they are being thought about and are not alone.

Home Bound - Bringing the Eucharist to the homebound also falls under the umbrella of Parish Social Ministry. She has noticed that there has been an increase in the demand for this. We do not have enough EM's. Hopefully we can get a few more EM's who can help in this area.

Transportation -PSM also provides transportation for people who need rides to doctors and appointments. There is a need for more volunteers since there presently are only two volunteers for this task.

Prayer Shawl -As part of the prayer shawl ministry, prayer shawls are blessed before the 8:00am Mass the first Sunday of the Month. At the end of Mass people are offered to take one home.

Rosary Makers – Lynn said she couldn't even count the number of rosary beads that they have shipped all over the world.

Senior Group - which meets once a month and provides an opportunity for some of our more senior parishioners to socialize.

Blood Drive – although the last two years we have had difficulty coordinating the availability of the Red Cross team to supervise the blood drive here at SSPJ, Lynn is hopeful that we will be able to continue this most worthwhile project.

School Supplies – provides need school supplies and backpacks to kids at the beginning of the school year.

Blessing of the Animals - Every year on the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, we celebrate by having a special blessing for all God's creatures.

Soup Supper – On Ash Wednesday before the evening Mass and ash distribution, we host a Lenten supper with homemade meatless soups. It is a time for sharing and fellowship at the start of the Lenten season.

Thanksgiving Food Drive – last year we provided gift cards to 21 local persons so that families can make a Thanksgiving meal of their choice

Christmas/Pick a Star – Have helped so many various organizations and have been able to provide a joyful Christmas to 22 families due to the generosity of the parishioners.

Peace and Justice - presently on a hiatus due to the aging of the group and the inability to attend meetings

All Souls Day – Special Mass of Remembrance for our loved ones who have gone home to God during the year.

Prayer Ministry – Prayer petitions placed in basket are collected and sent to our “prayer warriors” for individual remembrance.

Assisting with Bills – we have paid utilities, rent, electricity, car insurance, telephone bills for those in need. We have spent over \$26,000 helping people.

Lynn stated it is joyful to help people and get good results.







He Practiced What He Preached

This Week's Readings at Mass


- ▶ Isaiah 8:23-9:3 - The Prince of Peace
- ▶ 1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17 - Factions
- ▶ Matthew 4:12-23 - Jesus in Capernaum

After Jesus' baptism and temptation in the desert (a peak experience followed by a period of intense testing) he is primed to begin the work that he has prepared his whole life to be able to do. Jesus begins in the small, nondescript town of Capernaum populated mostly by Gentiles (non-Jews). Looking back in scripture, Matthew noticed that specific area had been promised a savior who would bring light to their world of darkness. For all the Jews in his audience, Matthew makes the point that Jesus was the fulfillment of that promise from the prophet Isaiah hundreds of years earlier. Matthew is trying to show that Jesus came to live and minister to and among both Jews and Gentiles and to invite all of them to the fullness of life he was teaching.

Jesus begins his public ministry sounding like John the Baptist. "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." We might interpret that now as "Get busy. Get serious. It's time to start living in God's way. There isn't much time left." Then Jesus calls Peter, Andrew, James, and John to be his helpers and companions as he gets busy healing the sick and proclaiming the Good News. If only everyone who preached repentance and the kingdom of God would get busy practicing what they preached!



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The Little Way

Most of us have heard of St. Therese of Lisieux, a French mystic who died at age 24 in 1897 and who is perhaps the most popular saint of the last two centuries. She's famous for many things, not least for a spirituality she called her "little way". What's her "little way"?

Popular thought has often encrusted both Therese and her "little way" within a simple piety which doesn't do justice to the depth of her person or her spirituality. Too often her "little way" is understood simply to mean that we do little, hidden, humble, acts of charity for others in the name of Jesus, without expecting anything in return. In this popular interpretation we do the laundry, peel potatoes, and smile at unpleasant people to please Jesus. In some ways, of course, this is true; however her "little way" merits a deeper understanding.

Yes, it does ask us to do humble chores and be nice to each other in the name of Jesus but there are deeper dimensions to it. Her "little way" is a path to sanctity based on three things: *Littleness*, *Anonymity*, and a *Particular Motivation*.

Littleness: For Therese "littleness" does not refer first of all to the littleness of the act that we are doing, like the humble tasks of doing the laundry, peeling potatoes, or giving a simple smile to someone who's unpleasant. It refers to our own littleness, to our own radical poverty before God. Before God, we are little. To accept and act out of that constitutes humility. We move towards God and others in her "little way" when we do small acts of charity for others, not out of our strength and the virtue we feel at that moment, but rather out of a poverty, powerlessness, and emptiness that allows God's grace to work through us so that in doing what we're doing we're drawing others to God and not to ourselves.

As well, our littleness makes us aware that, for the most part, we cannot do the big things that shape world history. But we can change the world more humbly, by sowing a hidden seed, by being a hidden antibiotic of health inside the soul of humanity, and by splitting the atom of love inside our own selves. And yes, too, the "little way" is about doing little, humble, hidden things.

Anonymity: Therese's "little way" refers to what's hidden, to what's done in secret, so that *what the Father sees in secret will be rewarded in secret*. And what's hidden is not our act of charity, but we, ourselves, who are doing the act. In Therese's "little way" our little acts of charity will go mostly unnoticed, will seemingly have no real impact on world history, and won't bring us any recognition. They'll remain hidden and unnoticed; but inside the Body of Christ what's hidden, selfless, unnoticed, self-effacing, and seemingly insignificant and unimportant is the most vital vehicle of all for grace at a deeper level. Just as Jesus did not save us through sensational miracles and headline-making deeds but through selfless obedience to his Father and quiet martyrdom, our deeds too can remain unknown so that our deaths and the spirit we leave behind can become our real fruitfulness.

Finally, her "little way" is predicated on a *Particular Motivation*. We are invited to act out of our littleness and anonymity and do small acts of love and service to others for a particular reason, that is, to, metaphorically, wipe the face of the suffering Christ. How so?

Therese of Lisieux was an extremely blessed and gifted person. Despite a lot of tragedy in her early life, she was (by her own admission and testimony of others) loved in a way that was so pure, so deep, and so wonderfully affectionate that it leaves most people in envy. She was also a very attractive child and was bathed in love and security inside an extended family within which her every smile and tear were noticed, honored, (and often photographed). But as she grew in maturity it didn't take her long to notice that what was true in her life wasn't true of most others. Their smiles and tears went mostly unnoticed and were not honored. Her "little way" is therefore predicated on this particular motivation. In her own words:

"One Sunday, looking at a picture of Our Lord on the Cross, I was struck by the blood flowing from one of his divine hands. I felt a pang of great sorrow when thinking this blood was falling on the ground without anyone's hastening to gather it up. I was resolved to remain in spirit at the foot of the Cross and to receive its dew. ... Oh, I don't want this precious blood to be lost. I shall spend my life gathering it up for the good of souls. ... To live from love is to dry Your Face."

To live her "little way" is to notice and honor the unnoticed tears falling from the suffering faces of others.
