Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

Happy Epiphany! Today's first reading says, "your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you". This glorious Light shines *upon* you and me, and does so in such a way that the Light shines *within* you and me. The word epiphany means a "shining forth", a manifestation of the presence of God. On this feast, we hear the gospel story of the light of the star guiding the Magi to Jesus, the Light of the world. These wise travelers noticed the Light, followed the Light, and allowed themselves to be transformed by the Light. May we be wise travelers this coming year -- noticing God's presence and invitations, following God's paths, and allowing God to transform us, so that we might be the Light for others.

Many of us may remember this feast being called "Little Christmas". Our custom of gift giving at Christmas time is often traced to the visit and gift giving of the Magi, the wise ones who searched for the newborn king, recognized him in the unlikely setting of a manger in Bethlehem, and knelt before him, offering not just gold, frankincense and myrrh, but offering their hearts. Epiphany celebrates God's "showing forth," — Jesus' manifestation to the world. We celebrate that God "shows up" in the places where there is need, just when darkness seems to have an unbreakable grip on our heart and spirit.

When has God "showed up" in your life? Through what people? what events? These are "epiphanies" too. Have you been an epiphany in someone's life? Sure you have. Many times. On this feast of journeying, searching, finding, and recognizing the shining forth of Jesus in all the spaces and places of our lives – especially the most unexpected – let's join the wise Magi in paying homage, and offering the true gifts of our hearts.

Traditionally today's Epiphany feast has been a day for the blessing of home and family. Surely all of us could benefit from pronouncing over our homes today: "Bless this house and all who inhabit it. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love". It's another way to make Epiphany not simply an abstract feast we celebrate but something we experience and fulfill with our lives.

A tremendous "thank you" to all who joined in letting hope and joy shine forth in our celebrations this Christmas season – our music ministers, liturgical ministers, decorators, and all in the pews whose generosity and love continue to make Christ felt in SSPJ. Christmas and Epiphany do shine forth!

As we journey into 2020 (not just a new year, but also a new decade!) with God's abundant blessings, my hope is that together we may continue to build on all the goodness present in our parish. We are all called to a ministry of service, helping to create what Pope Francis has called the revolution of tenderness. Doesn't that sound appealing? Wondering how you might serve? Throughout the year there will be invitations presented – often "little ways" - which as you know I like to call "bite-size" opportunities - not overwhelming or demanding more time than you can give. Whether it be helping with some aspect of faith formation with our young people or assisting with a parish project or exploring participation in a sacramental ministry or lending your voice to our choir or trying another way of praying or ??? Together, let's be wise followers of the Light of Christ.





Please note that our evening time schedule has changed, beginning one half-hour later than before.



Anointing of the Sick

I was anointed before during a serious illness. May I be anointed again?
I'm having major surgery in a few weeks. When should I be anointed?
I suffer from severe arthritis. Am I eligible to be anointed?

With our renewed understanding of the Anointing of the Sick, many questions such as those above are asked. The introduction to the rite states that this sacrament is intended for "those Christians whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or old age." (#97) As our knowledge of the human person has grown, we recognize that illness may be not only physical, but also psychological, emotional and spiritual. When a condition seriously affects how we live our lives, celebrating the Anointing of the Sick may be appropriate. Many persons advancing in years live full and active lives. However, some may be confronted with increasing limitations, perhaps not due to a specific illness. These persons may also wish to celebrate the sacrament, seeking God's peace.

So, at a celebration of the Anointing of the Sick we may find a variety of people gathered – people struggling with serious illness, both critical or chronic; older people seeking strength to adjust to physical limitations; persons struggling with an addiction or depression; persons preparing for imminent surgery; etc. Also gathered will be members of the community, family and friends, all joining in praying for God's healing and peace for those being anointed.

After being anointed once, when may a person seek the sacrament again? This depends on the person's situation. If a new illness or limitation develops, people may wish to celebrate the sacrament again. If there is a relapse or reoccurrence of an illness, the sacrament may be celebrated again. If a condition is chronic or ongoing, or if a person continues to struggle with daily limitations, some prayerful reflection is advised to discern when it might be appropriate to be anointed again. Consultation with a priest is helpful in discerning the timing of celebrating again.

What might the effects of celebrating this sacrament be?

"The first grace of this sacrament is one of strength-

ening, peace and courage to overcome the difficulties that go with the condition of serious illness or the frailty of old

age." (CCC#1520) The Second Vatican Council reminded us that "the purpose of the sacraments is to make people holy, to build up



the Body of Christ and to give worship to God." (SC #59) Through the celebration of this sacrament, those being anointed seek to gain strength, hope and healing – though the kind of healing is entrusted to God. We don't call the shots! We unite ourselves more closely with Jesus, who also knew pain and suffering. We trust that Jesus walks with us, sharing our burden, offering us peace – his peace.

Those celebrating the
Anointing of the Sick
are examples for all of us
of the power of faith.
Their prayer does
"build up the Body of Christ"
— that is, us.
And we who celebrate with them
enrich our own faith
as we support their journey.

CELEBRATING THE ANOINTING OF THE SICK AT SSPJ

Anointing of the Sick will be celebrated on the first Sunday of the month following the 8am Mass, beginning January 5th.

If someone in need of anointing is unable to come to Mass, please contact the rectory so that arrangements may be made for the priest to anoint at home. Again, family and friends are encouraged to be present, joining in prayer for the person who is ill. The priest will bring all that is needed for the sacrament with him. You may wish to light a candle, as a sign of Christ, our Light, shining through any darkness of illness.





Jesus comes from humble beginnings and begins his public career showing humility. Jesus was born to humble parents, a peasant carpenter and a young mother of no particular standing. He was born in the relatively unknown town of Bethlehem, nothing like the centers of power and prestige in Jerusalem and Rome of his day. He was visited by the esteemed magi and given lavish gifts, but immediately after, his family became refugees, fleeing their home country for their lives. When they returned, they had to begin building their life again in the simple, small town of Nazareth. It's no surprise then that Jesus grows to adulthood without an inflated ego.

Right from the beginning of Jesus' adult life, we see how his humility plays out at his baptism. John was the famous one at that point, with huge crowds of people leaving their homes and workplaces to go out into the desert to hear him preach and teach. Humble, poor people were going to him to be baptized, as well as the well-educated and well-off religious leaders of the day. Jesus thought it was only right that he began his public ministry by being baptized "with all the rest." In his solidarity with all humans, Jesus doesn't ask for special treatment because he is the Son of God. At his baptism, he signals how he will live the rest of his life, accepting what comes at him as any other human has to. In case there was any doubt, the voice from heaven makes it clear that Jesus is God's Son, the Beloved. But even those words don't go to Jesus' head. He simply does what is his to do next: going into the wilderness for 40 days and then beginning to

teach and heal. He is a perfect example of one who accepts his belovedness and retains his

"This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well-pleased."

Taking our Wounds to the Eucharist

Recently a man came to me, asking for help. He carried some deep wounds, not physical wounds, but emotional wounds to his soul. What surprised me initially was that, while he was deeply wounded, he had not been severely traumatized either in childhood or adulthood. He seemed to have just had to absorb the normal bumps and bruises that everyone has to absorb: some belittling, some bullying, never being the favorite, dissatisfaction with his own body, unfairness within his family and siblings, career frustration, unfairness in his workplace, the sense of being chronically ignored, the sense of never being understood and appreciated, and the self-pity and lack of self-confidence that results from this.

But he was a sensitive man and the combination of all these seemingly little things left him, now in late mid-life, unable to be the gracious, happy Elder he wanted to be. Instead, by his own admission, he was chronically caught-up in a certain wounded self-absorption, namely, in a self-centered anxiety that brought with it the sense that life had not been fair to him. Consequently he was forever somewhat focused on self-protection and was resentful of those who could step forward openly in self-confidence and love. "I hate it," he shared, "when I see persons like Mother Teresa and Pope John Paul speak so with such easy self-confidence about how big their hearts are. I always fill with resentment and think: 'Lucky you!' You haven't had to put up with what I've had to put up with in life!"

This man had been through some professional therapy that had helped bring him to a deeper self-understanding, but still left him paralyzed in terms of moving beyond his wounds. "What can I do with these wounds?" he asked.

My answer to him, as for all of us who are wounded, is: *Take those wounds to the Eucharist*. Every time you go to a Eucharist, stand by an altar, and receive communion, bring your helplessness and paralysis to God, ask him to touch your body, your heart, your memory, your bitterness, your lack of self-confidence, your self-absorption, your weaknesses, your impotence. Bring your aching body and heart to God. Express your helplessness in simple, humble words: *Touch me. Take my wounds. Take my paranoia. Make me whole. Give me forgiveness. Warm my heart. Give me the strength that I cannot give myself.*

Pray this prayer, not just when you are receiving communion and being physically touched by the body of Christ, but especially during the Eucharistic prayer because it is there that we are not just being touched and healed by a person, Jesus, but we are also being touched and healed by a sacred event. This is the part of the Eucharist we generally do not understand, but it is the part of the Eucharist that celebrates transformation and healing from wound and sin. In the Eucharist prayer we commemorate the "sacrifice" of Jesus, that is, that event where, as Christian tradition so enigmatically puts it, <u>Jesus was made sin for us</u>. There is a lot in that cryptic phrase. In essence, in his suffering and death, Jesus took on our wounds, our weaknesses, our infidelities, and our sins, died in them, and then through love and trust brought them to wholeness.

Every time we go to Eucharist we are meant to let that transforming event touch us, touch our wounds, our weaknesses, our infidelities, our sin, and our emotional paralysis and bring us to a transformation in wholeness, energy, joy, and love.

The Eucharist is the ultimate healer. There is, I believe, a lot of value in various kinds of physical and emotional therapies, just there is immeasurable value in 12-Step programs and in simply honestly sharing our wounded selves with people we trust. There is too, I believe, value in a certain willful self-effort, in the challenge contained in Jesus' admonition to a paralyzed man: *Take up your couch and walk!* We should not allow ourselves to be paralyzed by hyper-sensitivity and self-pity. God has given us skin to cover our rawest nerves.

But, with that being admitted, we still cannot heal ourselves. Therapy, self-understanding, loving friends, and disciplined self -effort can take us only so far, and it is not into full healing. Full healing comes from touching and being touched by the sacred. More particularly, as Christians, we believe that this touching involves a touching of the sacred at that place where it has most particularly touched our own wounds, helplessness, weaknesses, and sin, that place, where God "was made sin for us". That place is the event of the death and rising of Jesus and that event is made available to us, to touch and enter into, in the Eucharistic prayer and in receiving the body of Christ in communion.

We need to bring our wounds to the Eucharist because it is there that the sacred love and energy that lie at the ground of all that breathes can cauterize and heal all that is not whole within us.



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
