Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends.

In today's gospel, Jesus prays for the community - the community of his disciples - and that includes us. Fr. Jude Siciliano, OP, reflects:

Our parish church has often provided us with a community to celebrate our joys, as well as offer us solace and comfort when we needed it. It has introduced us to a big family that has nothing to do with blood lines, skin color, language, or place of origin. Here, at very special moments, and even ordinary ones, we felt we could almost touch the mystery of God.

There is something else: While we have been strengthened and comforted in our worshiping community and enabled to return to face our lives "out there," still, it should also have been a place where we were made restless and uncomfortable – if the gospel was the focus of preaching and our worship.

In today's gospel, Jesus is praying for his disciples, whom he is about to leave behind. He is praying for us as well. "I gave them your word, and the world hated them." While the Word of God, Christ's gift to us, can reassure us and give us comfort, it also should make us uncomfortable, for it questions our lives, probes our values and challenges how we treat one another. No escape here! In this place, as we gather week after week and listen to Christ's words, we are made aware that we are not yet fully the disciples Jesus calls us to be: not yet, forgiving, compassionate, loving and just.

Thank you for enriching our community of Apostles of Hope!

Happy Mother's Day to all mothers, grandmothers, godmothers, mothers-to-be and all who have loved and guided us with a mother's love. During May we honor Mary, the Mother of Jesus. One of Mary's many titles is Queen of Peace. Each day of May let's say an extra prayer - perhaps when praying grace - asking Mary to help us to bring peace to our world and to our families. So much violence fills our newspapers and our media. May Mary guide us to non-violent alternatives for resolving conflicts and expressing emotions.

Next weekend we celebrate the great feast of the beginnings of the church. Yes, it's time for the wearing of the RED, a traditional color for the Holy Spirit, to mark the feast of Pentecost. Jesus promised to send the Spirit as our Advocate, our Helper, One who deepens in us the gifts of wisdom, understanding, knowledge, courage, right judgment, reverence and wonder and awe. So as we take down our Paschal Lambs and we extinguish the light on our Paschal Candle which has been lit at every Mass this Easter season, we allow the Spirit to lead us as Apostles of Hope to love and to serve. As Apostles of Hope, may we reflect the fruits of the Spirit – love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. We are the Church together!

Many thanks to all who supported the religious formation of our young ones this year in the Barnabas Ministry, i.e. those who responded to the children's reflection with words of encouragement and affirmation! If you'd like to share any of your thoughts on the experience, I would appreciate hearing them. Additionally, we will be holding an evaluation and "fine tuning" session on the reflections sheets on Tuesday, May 22nd, in the Philip and James Room. All are invited to join in as we begin preparations for next season. And,





"I knew something was wrong as soon as I saw him..."

For Long Island's homebound seniors, Meals-on-Wheels is a lifesaver. Every weekday, the program delivers hot, nutritious meals to seniors in Nassau and Suffolk counties. Meals-on-Wheels case managers also assist these seniors in accessing other services they might need.

"I knew something was wrong as soon as I saw him," explains Steve, a driver for Catholic Charities' Meals-on-Wheels. Steve had been delivering meals to Ed for several years and upon arriving that fateful day, immediately observed that he seemed discrepented.

Steve knew Ed was diabetic, so he checked his blood sugar and saw that it was low. He poured him some orange juice but sensed there was something more serious going on. "I kept asking him to let me call 911 but he resisted. I couldn't accept that so I just casually stuck around, making my case. He finally admitted that he didn't have anyone to care for his dog if he was hospitalized, so I promised I would, and that's when he gave me the green light to call."

It was a good thing, too. At the hospital Ed was diagnosed with a serious blood infection that kept him there for nearly four months. In the meantime, Steve cared for the dog until Ed's sister arrived from out of town.

Reflections on Next Sunday's Scripture Readings

Acts 2:1-11 Psalm 104 1 Corinthians 12:3b-7,12-13 John 20:19-23

The Scriptures for this Solemnity of Pentecost highlight the role of the Holy Spirit in the Christian community. The movement of the Spirit in people results in gifts and talents. This movement does not reach its end in individuals. Rather, it is supposed to have a ripple effect so that our unique abilities promote the common good. Clearly, the Spirit forms community.

Pentecost signals the start of the universal mission of the Church. It is a mission that overcomes human obstacles and has the Spirit as its driving force. The disciples received the Spirit and began speaking to different audiences in their own tongues. From these many different peoples and populations a Christian community was emerging.

Paul's Corinth was a community whose chief characteristic was division. The community believed in rugged individualism. Personal talents were flaunted rather than shared. In the face of this diversity of gifts, works, and ministries, Paul stressed unity. Paul argued that the gifts were all expressions of the same Spirit and given for the common good.

In John's Gospel, the gift of the Spirit is anticipated when Jesus addresses the disciples with "peace." Jesus then proceeds to breathe upon them, suggesting a new creation (see Genesis 2:7). The reception of the Spirit empowers the disciples to forgive or retain sins. Sin, for John, is basically the refusal to believe in Jesus. Hence, the Spirit-filled disciples will challenge people to decide for or against Jesus.

When we raise the issue of gifts and talents, we tend to limit them to professional people in show business, sports, music, and so forth. Our perspective should be broader. Patience, understanding, and consolation are all gifts we possess. Wherever one uses such gifts for the community, the Spirit is obviously present.

For reflection...

Jesus again greets the disciples (and us) with "Peace be with you". He also sends them and us to do the same. In what ways might we share the peace of Christ with others at home? in the parish? beyond the parish?

PROTEST, SANITY, AND A CHRISTIAN RESPONSE

Dreaming is sometimes the most realistic thing we can do. Or, is there still something else we might do, like public protest, or something else?

In his book on prophecy, Commandments for the Long Haul, Daniel Berrigan offers this advice. Prophetic gestures aren't always politically effective. Often they accomplish nothing that's practical; but he adds: If you can't save the world at least you can save your own sanity.

Sometimes that's all that can be accomplished by our protests against injustice. Moreover struggling to salvage our own sanity is not as privatized as it first appears. When we protest something that's wrong, even though we know our protest is not going to practically change anything, the sanity we are saving is not just our own. We're also *saving the sanity of the moment*.

Commenting on the current activism on the issues of human rights and the environment of Booker Prize winning novelist, Arundhati Roy, art critic, John Berger, says this: "Profound political protest is an appeal to a justice that is absent, and is accompanied by a hope that in the future this justice will be established; this hope, however, is not the first reason the protest is made. One protests because not to protest would be too humiliating, too diminishing, too deadly. One protests (by building a barricade, taking up arms, going on a hunger strike, linking arms, shouting, writing) in order to save the present moment, whatever the future holds. ... A protest is not principally a sacrifice made for some alternative, more just future; it is an inconsequential redemption of the present." In essence, it preserves some sanity in the present moment.

But it may be inconsequential in terms of practically changing anything. Most everything remains the same. The injustice continues, the poor continue to be poor, the international scene continues to threaten war, racists continue to be racist, the environment continues to be ravaged, corruption continues to go unchecked, and dishonesty continues to get away with its lies. And so people go on marches, go to prison, go on hunger strikes, and sometimes even die for protesting, while the injustice, corruption, and dishonesty go on. At a certain point, logically and inevitably, we need to ask ourselves the question young Marius, in Jean Val Jean's, *Les Miserables*, asks after his friends have died while protesting and nothing seemingly changed: *What was your sacrifice for? Was this worth dying for?*

Those questions are valid, but they can have a positive answer. They didn't die in vain, for nothing, for an impractical idealism, for a naïve dream, for something they'd have outgrown had they lived longer. Rather their death was "an inconsequential redemption" of the present moment, meaning, its practical effectiveness may be immeasurable, but the moral seed it sows inside that moment will eventually help produce things that are measurable. All the women who initially protested for the vote never got to vote. But today many women do get to vote. The moral seed they planted in their inconsequential protests eventually produced something practical.

Sometimes you might feel pretty alone in making your protest and it might seem that you're working only at saving your own sanity and bewailing only your own diminishment and humiliation. But no one is an island. Your diminishment, your humiliation, and your sanity, are part of the immune system of all humanity. Everyone's health is partially dependent upon your health; just your health is partially dependent upon everyone else's.

And so protest is always in order and is indeed mandated by our faith. We may not remain passive in the face of injustice, inequality, racism, indifference to the poor, indifference to the Mother Nature, corruption, and dishonesty. We need to sow moral seeds into the present moment. How?

Not all of us (perhaps even most of us) are called upon to take up placards, make public protest, have ourselves arrested, or lay down our lives for a cause – except when the injustice or corruption is so extreme as to merit that. Normally, for most of us, our protest must be real but need not be the witness of martyrs.

I very much like a counsel proposed by Archbishop Paul-Andre Durocher of Gatineau, Quebec, in a recent issue of *America* magazine. Commenting on the tensions that exist today between our Christian faith and the complex challenges that come to us from the world, Durocher, after first acknowledging that there are no easy answers, offers this counsel: "The first step is to acknowledge them [the tensions]. Second, to understand why they arise. Third, to accept and even embrace them. And fourth, to commit to living a mature Christian faith in spite of those tensions." (*America, April 30, 2018*)

In the face of all that's happening in our world, some of which goes against everything we believe in and hold dear, sometimes all we can do is to hold our own moral ground, humbly, prophetically – and perhaps quietly.

And since that's all we can do, it's surely enough.
