Father Tom's Words for the Week

Dear Friends,

Today's gospel continues Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. These teachings are both consoling and challenging. Faith and trust in Jesus is the key. Fr. Jude Siciliano reflects:

Jesus called his disciples to exemplary behavior. Such ways of being with one another, besides forming loving relationships in the community, would also draw attention to that community and to the teachings of the one they followed – Jesus. Today Jesus is giving concrete examples of what we heard him say to his disciples last week. They are to be "salt of the earth," "light of the world" and a "city set on a mountain."....

We Christians are called to a different way of living, in our relations to each other and then to the world. We seek reconciliation where there is anger and alienation. We tame our desires despite the license of the world around us. We are faithful to one another and so, when we make promises, we keep them.

What will help us live the challenges Jesus places before us? Certainly we can't do it merely by gritting our teeth and putting our nose to the grindstone. Instead, we fix our eyes on Jesus and we turn to each other in mutual love and support. Sound idealistic? Yes it does, but Jesus wouldn't ask us to fulfill something he wouldn't help us accomplish.

This weekend we begin our 2020 Catholic Ministries Appeal. As you well know, this is an opportunity for us to put faith in action, to be light in our world, as we both help those beyond ourselves and also help ourselves both spiritually and practically. Diocesan programs assisting people in need, religious formation efforts, food and housing programs and campus ministry are a few of the ways CMA enables us to reach out to others.

The CMA rebate is our greatest parish fundraiser. Last year with our rebate we were able to help defray the \$5,000 needed to maintain, tune and repair our pipe organ, cover the \$1,300 cost associated with the purchase of 10 freestanding dry erase boards and supplies needed for religious education classes, purchase new chairs for our choir loft and offset the \$10,000 expense to upgrade wiring for IT in our school buildings, benefitting parochial school and religious education classes. This year we hope to use our rebate to address the dangerous hazard caused by the blue stone in the front of the church which freezes over and is resistant to the de-icers used to try to ensure safety.

So, please, prayerfully consider your pledge to CMA this year. Our CMA goal this year is \$111,000. With help from as many as possible we can again meet our goal, thus receiving our rebate. We will have been a vital part of building the city of God!

Please be sure to mark your calendar and head to our Parish Mardi Gras. It promises to be a great time for all ages. As we burn last year's palms (please bring in your old ones beginning next weekend) and ready ourselves to embark on the Lenten journey, we'll have all kinds of foods, desserts etc. So plan on it to be your evening meal! All kinds of fun things are planned. Check out today's bulletin insert.

Our Lenten theme this year will pick up on last year's "I say YES my Lord". Hopefully, you remember the tune which seemed to capture many hearts. I've invited different parish groups to put together a few lines describing what that phrase means to them. You'll see them in upcoming bulletins. If you'd like to share what the phrase means to you, please send it me and I'll be happy to share your insight.

We are honored to welcome those who assist in the medical field to join us at the 12noon Mass today for the "White Coat Mass", celebrating all who serve in healing professions. We thank each of you for your healing vocation and for the care you give to us. In our prayer, we bring you before the Divine Physician asking Him, to further bless, strengthen and encourage you in your service to us.

I hope you are readying your act and gearing up for our upcoming Talent Show! Do you sing, dance, play an instrument, tell a joke? Check out the audition days and come on down!

The Value Behind the Laws


This Week's Readings at Mass

This long excerpt from the Sermon on the Mount demonstrates both how thoroughly Jewish Jesus was in his understanding of the world, and also how radical he was in his interpretation of Jewish laws. Matthew makes it clear that Jesus has great respect for his religious tradition; he has not come to throw out Jewish teachings and start a new religion. He has come to shed light on ancient teachings and to challenge people to look for and embrace the spirit behind the letter of the law.

Jesus calls out the scribes and the Pharisees who have gotten so caught up in trying to win their salvation or the favor of others by obeying the rules perfectly that they have lost sight of the original intent behind them. The Pharisees and scribes aren't alone in their vice - there are some people in every religion who get off track in this way. Jesus wants his listeners to look deeper than the laws themselves. What is the value they are trying to uphold? How are they offering life, and a fuller life, to those who would follow them? For example, many of us can avoid murdering another human being, but none of us escapes being angry at others. Jesus is pointing out that we need to look at the root of our behavior (anger and lust in this passage) to see where we are imprisoned. Anger, without


murder, still imprisons us and the person we are angry with. Lust, even without adultery, does harm to our most intimate relationship. So let's not let ourselves off the hook like the Pharisees just because we seem to have our acts



together on the surface. Let's look for where we can invite in more freedom, compassion, and graciousness - for our sake and for the sake of everyone we are in relationship with.

Questions of the Week

The commandments that Jesus mentions aren't arbitrary rules handed down on from on high just to make our lives harder. They invite us to greater freedom. Share an example of how choosing to follow a law, commandment, or teaching from the Bible has made your life better or richer in some way, even if it was difficult?

Magnanimity

What does it mean to be big-hearted, magnanimous?

Once during a baseball game in high school an umpire made very unfair call against our team. Our whole team was indignant and all of us began to shout angrily at the umpire, swearing at him, calling him names, loudly venting our anger. But one of our teammates didn't follow suit. Instead of shouting at the umpire he kept trying to stop the rest of us from doing so. "Let it go!" he kept telling us, "Let it go – we're bigger than this!" Bigger than what? He wasn't referring to the umpire's immaturity, but to our own. And we weren't "bigger than this", at least not then. Certainly I wasn't. I couldn't swallow an injustice. I wasn't big enough.

But something stayed with me from that incident, the challenge to "be bigger" inside the things that slight us. I don't always succeed, but I'm a better person when I do, more big-hearted, just as I am more-petty and smaller of heart when I don't.

But just as our teammate challenged us all those years ago, we remain challenged to "be bigger" than the pettiness within a moment. That invitation lies at the very heart of Jesus' moral challenge in the *Sermon on the Mount*, There he invites us to have "a virtue that's deeper than that of the Scribes and the Pharisees". And there's more hidden in that statement than first meets the eye because the Scribes and Pharisees were very virtuous people. They strove hard always to be faithful to all the precepts of their faith and were people who believed in and practiced strict justice. They didn't make unfair calls as umpires! But inside of all of that goodness they still lacked something that the *Sermon on the Mount* invites us to, a certain magnanimity, to have big enough hearts and minds that can rise above being slighted so as to be bigger than a given moment.

Let me offer this example of what that can mean: John Paul II was the first pope in history to speak out unequivocally against capital punishment. It's important to note that he didn't say that capital punishment was wrong. Biblically we do have the right to practice it. John Paul conceded that. However, and this is the lesson, he went on to say that, while we may in justice practice capital punishment, we shouldn't do it because Jesus calls us to something higher, namely, to forgive sinners and not execute them. That's magnanimity, that's being bigger than the moment we're caught up within.

Thomas Aquinas, in his moral astuteness, makes a distinction that one doesn't often hear either in church teachings or in common sense. Thomas says that a certain thing can be sin for one person and yet not for another. In essence, something can be a sin for someone who is big-hearted, even as it is not a sin for someone who is petty and small of heart. Here's an example: In a wonderfully challenging comment, Thomas once wrote that it is a sin to withhold a compliment from someone who genuinely deserves it because in doing so we are withholding from that person some of the food upon which he or she needs to live. But in teaching this, Thomas is clear that this is a sin only for someone who is big-hearted, magnanimous, and at a certain level of maturity. Someone who is immature, self-centered, and petty of heart is not held to the same moral and spiritual standard.

How is this possible, isn't a sin a sin, irrespective of person? Not always. Whether or not something is a sin or not and the seriousness of a sin depends upon the depth and maturity within a relationship. Imagine this: A man and his wife have such a deep, sensitive, caring, respectful, and intimate relationship so that the tiniest expressions of affection or neglect speak loudly to each other. For example, as they part to go their separate ways each morning they always exchange an expression of affection, as a parting ritual. Now, should either of them neglect that expression of affection on an ordinary morning where there's no special circumstance, it would be no small, incidental matter. Something large would be being said. Conversely, consider another couple whose relationship is not close, where there is little care, little affection, little respect, and no habit of expressing affection upon parting. Such neglect would mean nothing. No slight, no intent, no harm, no sin, just lack of care as usual. Yes, some things can be a sin for one person and not for another.

We're invited both by Jesus and by what's best inside us to become big enough of heart and mind to know that it's a sin not to give a compliment, to know that even though biblically we may do capital punishment we still shouldn't do it, and to know that we're better women and men when we are bigger than any slight we experience within a given moment.
